## Foul Brood In Bees.

Editor Deseret News:

"Enquirer" wishes to know what  
constitutes foul brood, how it can  
be detected, whether it is possible  
to destroy it by fumigation or other  
means and thus save the hive. I  
will answer his questions, and also  
some of my brother bee-keepers  
that have written letters to me since  
my correspondence appeared in the  
papers. I do not know the cause of  
foul brood. It has baffled all of our  
intelligent bee-keepers east.

Question—How can it be de-  
tected in the hive? Answer—Healthy  
sealed or capped brood is full or  
oval shaped, while that infected  
with foul brood is sunk or indented.  
Stick the point of your knife in and  
you will find the brood dead, some  
will be a light color at first, some  
black, while many cells will have  
a liquid brownish substance, and  
will emit an offensive odor if the  
hive is badly affected.

In its cure we can save the hive  
but not the bees and comb. The  
hive can be saved by scalding with  
boiling water. Put all the frames  
in boiling water and thoroughly  
scald the hive, cap and boxes, in-  
side and out. Then put the frames  
in the hive, put the boxes and cap  
on and thoroughly fumigate with  
sulphur. You will then have a  
disinfected hive. But the hives  
have not been cleansed as advised  
above, or we would have gotten rid  
of the disease.

The old style of brimstoning bees  
to get a little honey is about done  
away with, at least by all intelli-  
gent bee-keepers. In my last cor-  
respondence I cautioned bee-keep-  
ers against purchasing hives that  
have had foul brood in. I have  
been informed of one party that  
has purchased such hives, and thus  
will be the cause of spreading the  
disease. Under such circumstances  
it is not better to bury hive and all,  
than to nurse the disease in those  
old hives, as has been the case?

BELGRADE, 19.—Dispatches from  
General Tchernayeff to Prince  
Milan report that his army is per-  
fectly reorganized and ready to re-  
sume the offensive. An extraordi-  
nary cabinet council was held yester-  
day, Prince Milan presiding, at  
which it was resolved to continue  
the war to the last extremity.

LONDON, 20.—An Athens dis-  
patch announces that an insurrec-  
tion has broke out at Retimo in  
Crete.

A dispatch from Alexandria,  
Egypt, says reports have been re-  
ceived from Abyssinia to the effect  
that Walda Mikael, the insurgent  
chief, has defeated the Abyssinians  
at Zakrada, and 1,500 women and  
children have been massacred.

LONDON, 20.—A special from Alex-  
andria, dated 18th, states that Gen. Tchernayeff  
has removed his headquarters to  
Delagrad, where he has massed 30,-  
000 men for a final stand. The  
abandonment of Alexinatz is con-  
templated.

A special from Berlin says it is  
stated that Gen. Tchernayeff's re-  
ports of a victory have changed the  
peaceful disposition of the Rus-  
sian government. Even the Czar  
is confidently expecting a favorable  
change in the position.

The Sardinians have abandoned  
mediatory efforts.

It is asserted the Porte possesses  
undeniable proofs that the Rus-  
sian consular agents have been in-  
citing insurrection in Bulgaria.

The financial crisis in Portugal  
originated in the failure of some  
financial banks in Oporto, and is  
the revival of the crisis there in  
May last, when some of the weak  
banks were assisted by the stronger  
institutions, and when the Govern-  
ment also advanced money. The  
bills then discounted for the weak  
banks have now run their course,  
and as this position is unimproved,  
the stronger banks refuse to renew  
the bills. It is expected that a  
large amount of sovereigns which  
have gone from the bank of Eng-  
land will restore confidence.
