## PARK VALLEY ACTIVE.

## The Mill at the Century Mine Has Been Undergoing Repairs.

Manager P. W. Madsen of the Century and Iona mines, in the Park Valley mining district, returned to the city last night, having spent a week in looking over the properties mentioned. Park Valley, Mr. Madsen declared to-

day, is in a very prosperous condition at the present time, and nearly all the properties in the camp of any consequence at all, are being worked.

The Big Buffalo has just increased its working force and other properties, idle during the winter, have begun energetio campaigns.

The Century is operating the usual number of men. The mine has never been in a better condition and Manager Madsen gives assurance of a continuation of dividends for an indefinite time The bullion output for the present month will be considerably lighter than usual for the reason that the mill has been running with a light battery. The plant has been undergoing a thorough overhauling and renovation. While this has been going on only a portion of the machinery has been in operation. By the end of the month the repairs will be finished and the mill will be in shape to make up for lost time, so it is expected that the April builton record will be a good one. Notwithstanding the changes going on the receipts for the aresent month will exceed the expenses hy considerable

When the mill is running full blast the 16 stamps are capable of handling from 50 to 60 tons of ore daily, with a 40-mesh battery screen. The ore aver-ages about \$5 to the ton.

They first promised the road last year, but were disappointed then. If it should go over so late that machinery could not be put up this year, those interested in min operations would become dis-
