FRENCHWOMAN PRAISES AMERICAN WOMEN

Madame Laurence Fiedler, of Parls, has been sent by the French govern ment to make an exhaustive arealy of the social and economic conditions obtaining among women in America and after a brief preliminary study has made the statement that the women of this country are the happiest. Drightest, best dressed and most independent in the world. The real purpose of Madame Feldler's work in this country is to solve the problem of higher wages for the working women of France and she will specif two years here in making her ro-searches. She has already made similar investigations among the working women of Germany, Denmark and Switzerland, in none of which countries did she find conditions at all comparable with the high standard in America. Upon her return to France she will recommend the establishment of women's clubs, having found them of great benefit here in advancing the general cause of wo-
