

COMPROMISE ON FINANCIAL BILL

Vreeland Measure Rejected by House Committee May Be Adopted at Conference.

PAYNE PROPOSITION TO FORE.

Speaker of Opinion That Members Would Not Care to Remain Week More to Hear Discussion.

Washington, May 4.—Notwithstanding the fact that the committee on banking and currency today voted to table the new Vreeland financial bill the impression prevailed among many members that the measure will be adopted at the conference of Representatives and Senators tomorrow night.

The vote in the committee, by which the Vreeland bill was tabled, was 13 to 3, Messrs. Weeks, Barton and McKinney voting in the negative. The committee adopted a resolution offered by Mr. Waldo, New York, requesting that suitable time be given, a week, possible, for discussion in the house of all pending currency measures. Chairman Fowler was authorized to lay this request before Speaker Cannon.

During the afternoon strong efforts were made to reach a compromise on the financial question, and the proposition advocated some time ago by Republican Floor Leader Payne was taken up by Chairman Fowler as the basis for an agreement. The proposition allows any national banking association, which has circulating notes outstanding secured by deposit of United States bonds to an amount equal to its capital stock actually paid in, to take out additional circulation upon deposit of United States bonds or certificates of indebtedness authorized during the Spanish-American wars. The proposition was acceptable to some of the house leaders, and also to members of the banking and currency committee. It was at first thought by offering this proposition as an amendment to the Fowler currency commission bill, the conference which has been called for tomorrow night could be obviated.

When the plan was laid before Speaker Cannon, together with the request of the committee for a week's debate, he informed Chairman Fowler that he had authority to call off the conference or to grant the time for the debate asked for. He stated that more than a sufficient number of Republicans had signed the call for the conference and that it was for the conference to determine what measures should be decided upon, and he gave it as his opinion that the members would not care to stay here an additional week listening to the financial discussion.

When the decision of the speaker became known, members of the banking committee held numerous conferences, and it was decided that the Payne proposition as an amendment to the currency commission bill should be offered at the conference of Republican members tomorrow night.

U. S. SUPREME COURT.

Motion Made by Interstate Commerce Commission to Advance Case.

Washington, May 4.—In the supreme court of the United States a motion was made today in behalf of the interstate commerce commission to advance on the docket the cross appeals of the commission and E. H. Harriman and Otto H. Kahn, the latter of the New York banking firm of Kahn, Loeb & Co., in the cases in which Harriman and Kahn refused to answer certain questions propounded by the commission in 1906 in connection with its inquiry into the alleged consolidation and combination of railroads subject to the interstate commerce law.

The questions covered a wide range of operations and the United States circuit court for the Southern district of New York to which the matter was submitted, directed the two witnesses to make reply to all except those relating to the purchase of stock by Mr. Harriman in anticipation of the Union Pacific dividend.

The motion to advance was made by Frank B. Kellogg, C. A. Sverance and John H. Marble as counsel for the commission. In presenting their motion they dwelt upon its vast importance because of the public interests involved.

Fort Scott, Kan., May 4.—On motion of the government in the federal court here today, the trial of Fred D. Warren, editor of the Appeal to Reason, was continued until the next term of court which will be in November. This is the third continuance requested by the government.

Clarence S. Darviss, who was the chief counsel in the defense of Haywood, Pettibone and Moyer of the Western Federation of Miners, at Boise, City, Idaho, appeared for Mr. Warren.

The charge against Editor Warren is based upon the mailing of a printed circular for \$1,000 for the kidnapping of ex-Gov. Taylor, of Kentucky. The Appeal to Reason made this sensational offer for the purpose of calling attention to the decision of the United States supreme court that the removal of the officers of the Western Federation of Miners from Colorado to Idaho for trial was not an illegal proceeding. The paper's reward indicated a desire to have ex-Gov. Taylor kidnapped and taken from Indiana to Kentucky for trial for alleged complicity in the assassination of Gov. Goebel.

Investigating Native Plot. Calcutta, May 4.—The police are investigating the native plot revealed here yesterday to murder Europeans by means of bombs, and the more thorough they go into the matter, the more widespread does it seem.

The authorities believe they are facing an attempt at revolution. A number of prominent Bengalees are implicated and sensational arrests are expected to follow.

FIRE IN GLOBE, ARIZ.

Building of the Globe Miners' Union Was Destroyed.

Globe, Ariz., May 4.—The building of the Globe Miners' union was destroyed by fire early today. The fire started on the first floor, occupied by the Monarch Clothing company. On the upper floor was the lodge room of the Miners' union and of other orders, which lost all their property except the books of the union.

The Monarch company claims the loss of stock valued at \$34,000, and insured for \$25,000. The loss of the Miners' union on the building and furniture, valued at \$10,000, is not insured. Other losses about \$4,000.

New York, May 4.—President Benjamin Ide Wheeler of the University of California has been nominated by the trustees of Columbia university and appointed by the Prussian minister of education as Theodore Roosevelt professor in Berlin for the year 1909 and 1910. The announcement of the appointment was made today at a meeting of the Columbia university trustees.

President Wheeler is one of the best known of American classical scholars. The subject of his courses in Berlin will be "Amerikanische Kulturgeschichte."

DIDN'T LIKE ASQUITH'S ANSWER

So Unionists in the Commons Have Raised the Irish Home Rule Question.

CHURCHILL'S UTTERANCES.

Premier Not Responsible for Construction Placed Upon Them by John E. Redmond.

London, May 4.—Dissatisfied with Premier Asquith's answer to the subject of home rule for Ireland, given in the house of commons April 30, in reply to a question by Walter Long, Conservative, the Unionists again raised the question in the house this afternoon.

They elicited a statement from the premier that he was not responsible for the construction placed upon them by the Irish league on the utterances of Winston Spencer Churchill during his Manchester campaign.

The only statement the premier authorized was that it was not possible for anyone to determine what issues would be placed before the country at the next general election, but the disabbling pledge given at the last election applied only to the existing parliament, and hereafter the Liberal party would claim to possess an absolutely free hand to deal with the whole problem of Irish government.

Mr. Asquith reiterated that the policy of Liberal government had been plainly expressed in his speech in the house of commons, on March 30, and in the amended resolution then adopted.

This resolution was as follows: "In the opinion of this house, a solution of his problem can only be attained by giving the Irish people legislative and executive control of all purely Irish affairs, all subject to the supreme authority of the imperial government."

ROADS FINED FOR VIOLATING TWENTY-FOUR HOUR LAW. Chicago, May 4.—In 95 cases brought by the government against railroad companies charging violation of the 24-hour law for transportation of cattle, Judge Landis, in the United States district court, today imposed fines aggregating \$25,150. The railroads fined were as follows:

Rock Island, \$5,550; Northwestern, \$3,800; Illinois Central, \$1,100; St. Paul, \$250; Santa Fe, \$750; and Burlington, \$250.

The majority of the fines were imposed on pleas of guilty, but in all cases the Chicago & Northwestern pleaded not guilty.

MORGAN DIX'S SUCCESSOR.

New York, May 4.—Rev. Dr. William T. Manning, vicar of St. Agnes' chapel in Trinity parish and assistant rector of the parish, was unanimously elected rector of Trinity parish today to succeed the late Dr. Morgan Dix, at a meeting of the Trinity parish vestry. Dr. Manning was called to this city as assistant rector of Trinity five years ago from Christ church at Nashville, Tennessee.

He was born at Northampton, England, in 1865, and came to the United States with his parents in 1878. He was graduated at the University of the South at Sewanee, Tenn. In 1891 he was ordained to the ministry of the Protestant church by Bishop Kip of California, and in 1893 he was chosen professor of dogmatic theology at the University of the South.
