LOCAL BRIEFS.

More Guest Rooms—The new cell house at the state prison will be completed in about 30 days, giving 300 cell accommodations.

Conductor Moore on Vacation—G. W. Moore, a Short Line conductor running on the Shoshone branch, is off on his annual vacation which takes him to Salt Lake. He says things are booming in the Grand Canyon.

Social Life of Young People—Rev. Herbert E. Hayes, of Third Presbyterian church is to speak on "The Social Life of Young People in the Churches," before the union meeting to be held next Sunday evening at 7:30 p. m. in the First Congregational church.

Gov. Harmon Coming—The Ohio society will meet at the Commercial club next Friday night, to arrange for the reception to President Taft. Governor Harmon is expected to arrive in Salt Lake at the time of the president's stay here.

Purse in Mail Box—A purse containing papers and railroad tickets with a card showing that the owner is a member of the Macon, Georgia, lodge of Elks, was found in a mail box and turned over to Postmaster Thomas yesterday afternoon. They are, apparently, the property of Dr. J. H. Shorter and wife who are returning home from Seattle.

To Entertain Officers—The officers of the National Guard are planning for a banquet to be tendered to the commissioned officers of the Fifteenth infantry at Fort Douglas in appreciation of the kindly and valuable attention shown by the latter to the guard during the stay of the regiment at Fort Douglas, and particularly in the help given in preparation for the guard's march to the Camp Perry.

Withdrawn From Entry—Notice of the withdrawal of 101,660 acres of land from entry along Green river, Utah, has been received by the local land office from the secretary of the Interior. The strip forms in a mail box and turned over to Postmaster Thomas yesterday afternoon. They are, apparently, the property of Dr. J. H. Shorter and wife who are returning home from Seattle.

Avails Investors—L. B. Kline of Seattle has written to the Salt Lake chamber of commerce calling attention to the location of a large body of tulle's earth about 350 miles from here on the Oregon short line, which offers, he says, a splendid field for the investment of Salt Lake capital. The deposit is said to cover 50 acres and to be 30 feet deep and of such a nature that it can be easily mined and treated for tooth and talcum powder.

Horses Die in Morgan—A mysterious malady is affecting Morgan county horses, six head having died at Crockett last week. E. A. Wild a Morgan county veterinarian, says the symptoms of two horses to this city for analysis, but there does not seem to be any provision made for expenses attending such operations, so it must be done at private expense. A similar disease obtained a year ago at Henderson where 24 head of horses died.

"Charity Sockers" Fakers—The public is warned by Bishop Lawrence Scanlan against two impostors, who in the garb of sisters of charity are soliciting alms. The women represent themselves to be securing funds for the aid of the orphanage. They called at a number of houses in the residential district yesterday, and Bishop Scanlan received numerous telephone calls regarding the two women. Their identity is unknown, but the police are keeping a watch for them.

Death Wins the Race—A. B. Scott, purchasing agent of the Boston Co., left hurriedly Sunday for Minneapolis where his wife was in a dying condition, hoping to reach her bedside before death. However, at Omaha, Mr. Scott received a message stating she was dead. He continued on to attend the funeral. The deceased had lived in Salt Lake a number of years, and leaves behind her husband, two sons, the older being Harry Scott, employed by the Utah Copper company at Gardfield.

The Jewish New Year—The Jewish New Year begins with sunset this evening, with appropriate services by the two local Jewish congregations. At tomorrow morning's services, Rabbi Hersh of the Orthodox congregation is to speak on Rosh Hashana, "The birthday of the Universe," and Rabbi Freund of the Reformed church will speak on "The Value of Repentance, Prayer and Charity." At the services Friday morning, Rabbi Hersh will take for his subject "The Sacrifice of Isaac."

M. H. Walker Returns—M. H. Walker and family returned last evening from the north, having trip through the north, including Victoria, B. C. Mr. Walker noted prosperous times in a business way, and was much pleased with the fair, which he found much more improved and better handled generally than has been usual with such enterprises. He heard much that was complimentary about the Tuberculosis choir on account of the good work they are doing in the presence of 20,000 people.

No Money for Parking—When the city park commission met yesterday it was discovered that there was no money left to complete the parking on Seventh East street between South Temple and the city hall, where asphaltum has already been laid. The commission was granted \$22,000 in the budget, but there is only \$2,340 of that amount left. The commissioners are holding this to pay their salaries until the next appropriation is made. It is probable that the commission will ask the council to appropriate enough money to finish the parking.

Death of Sterling P. Bonds—Word has been received here of the death Tuesday of Sterling P. Bonds, at Parma, Ida. He was well known in Salt Lake and was an old time pioneer here. He was 32 years of age and was the son of S. P. Bonds. Several years ago Mr. Bonds was connected with the Omaha Republican. He then went to Hastings, Neb., where he had an interest in the Gazette-Journal. When the plant was destroyed by fire he came west and worked at his trade in this city. For the past few years he was proprietor of the Illinois hotel at Parma. Mr. Bonds leaves a mother, a wife and four children.

Frank Moss' Lively Ride—Frank Moss was given an exciting ride yesterday afternoon when he climbed on a Honesty dairy wagon and attempted to stop the team, which was running away. The horses became frightened while standing near Second and State streets and made

a bolt down the street. Moss ran after them and once in the wagon caught the lines but was unable to check the horses. As they neared Fourth street they swerved, leaving a huge driver by Mrs. M. J. Coran of east. Sugar House with sufficient force to throw Mrs. Coran to the street, and then collided with a telephone pole. Just before the collision Moss jumped from the wagon and escaped injury.

SUSPECT ARRESTED.

Youth With Stolen Watches in His Possession is Behind Bars.

He denied any complicity in the burglary of the store, but told so many conflicting and implausible stories, that he was locked up and a charge will be made against him.

ENROLLMENT SHOWS INCREASE

Twelve Hundred Pupils Register During Second Week.

The enrollment in the public schools on Monday, the second week of school, showed an increase of 1,239 over and above the enrollment for the first week. The attendance last Monday was 15,299 and on the first day of school it was 14,060. The report shows that the attendance Monday is larger by 606 pupils than at any time last year during the school year. Here is the comparison compiled by Superintendent D. H.
