WILL STEP DOWN AND OUT.

Chairman George M. Cannon to Retire From the Chairmanship of the Republican State Committee.

Chairman George M. Cannon has publicly declared his intention to resign the chairmanship of the Republican State Central committee at an early date. He announces that his reason for doing so is the pressure of increasing private business which he cannot afford to neglect. He is also of the opinion that his successor should step into the place from which he retires at an early date in order that he might facilitate with the possibilities of next year's campaign. Among those most prominently suggested to succeed Mr. Cannon are H. A. L. Thompson and H. B. Campbell. Mr. Cannon has sent the following letter to the members of the state committee:

Our campaign is ended, and our cause victorious. Our victory is just sweep. I accept my thanks for all the encouragement upon the work done in your committee.

The work I took up is finished, or will be so soon as the votes are counted, and the committee are in the process of my private affairs. Mr. Cannon has also issued the following address to his party:

To the Republicans of Utah:

If all the people take the interest which should be taken in the government, the Union will be a nation of free men, and without regard to the good of the community as a whole, will be able to accomplish their scheme, and resulting benefits of such a nation will be seen in the wisdom displayed in the nomination made in the law enacted. In this work none should be expected to do a disproportionate share of the work, but each should contribute his full proportion.

At the time I accepted the position of chairman of your state central committee, I fully assumed the responsibility resting upon that office.

As a result of the election, a legislature has been chosen, with an overwhelming Republican majority. The first session of our representatives in Congress is assuredly Republican, and the state committee.

COMMITTEE MEETINGS.

The Sanitary, Public Grounds and Street Cleaning Divisions Important Matters.

The usual standing committee meetings were held in the joint building last night.

The sanitary committee had a conference with the management of the Salt Lake City Sewing company with reference to the refuse which is allowed to accumulate in the vicinity of their works. Mr. Martin stated that the company had done everything in its power to abate the nuisance, and they had always been and were now willing to join in any movement which would prove beneficial.
