WILL STEP DOWN AND OUT.

Chairman George M. Cannon to Resign
From the Chairmanship of the Re-
publican State Committee.

Hon. George M. Cannon has publicly declared his intention to resign the chairmanship of the Republican State Central Committee at an early date. He announces that his reason for doing so is the pressure of increasing private business which he cannot afford to neglect. He is also of the opinion that his successor should step into the place from which he retires at an early date in order that he might familiarize with the necessities of next year's campaign. Among those most prominently suggested to succeed Mr. Cannon are Hon. A. C. Thomas and H. S. Colton. Mr. Cannon has sent the following letter to the members of the committee:

Our party is weaker, and our cause weaker, but every man is most energetic. Accept my thanks for all your congratulations upon the work done in your county.

I will not take up much time, or will it be considered, or will the editorials be round. Under these circumstances, and owing to the pressure of my private affairs, I will reluctantly give up my position in the Republican State Central Committee, said resignation to be presented at the annual meeting of the State Central Committee on December 1st, and will be effective at a time to be fixed by said resignation. Kindly inform me by return mail when you can most conveniently meet in Salt Lake City.

Mr. Cannon was asked the following editorially:

At the close of the most important political session ever held in Utah, we find every man on one side, elected by a handsome majority, and the State Legislature more than two-thirds Republican, thus assuring the Republicans a safe majority in the United States Senate.

The work done has been made possible because of the heroic efforts of the Republicans, and the State Central Committee, by the people themselves, both men and women, and particularly by the present and county committees throughout the state.

The members of the State executive committee have, at all times, and by every other means within their power, assisted the Republicans, and have given their services in regard to the conduct of the campaign; this committee, however, has consistently waited.

The office of secretary has been admirably filled by Mr. L. J. Pardee, and the good work of the latter, as well as the help given by the lady members of the executive committee, Mrs. Elizabeth D. Walls and Mrs. Elizabeth M. Salter, are deserving of the warmest praise.

To all who have aided in the good work, I heartily extend my most hearty thanks. I hope that the Republicans will give more attention and attention to the affairs of our government. If we are to enjoy the benefits of the liberty which is the birthright of every American, this duty should be performed by all who love their country. If all the people take the interest which should be taken in politics, there would be less men who engage in politics simply for the spoils that follow success, and without regard to the good of the community as a whole, and less trouble to accomplish their schemes, and resulting benefits of such wicked villainy will be seen in the world displayed in the numerous scandals made public in the news media. In this connection, I expect to find a disinterested class, and none should decline to contribute his just proportion.

I am glad to accept the position of chairman of your State central committee. I fully respond the responsibility resting upon this office.

As a result of the election, a legislature has been chosen with over 80% Republican majority. The first session, and our representatives in Congress are assuredly Republican, and the State will

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care for the first five years of the new state are Republicans. Under these circumstances, and as my personal affairs demand my attention, I will reluctantly give up my position in the chairmanship of the State Central Committee, and that body no longer has no chairman. That is, I will not be able to do my duty, without fear or favor, and with a desire only for the good of the people of Utah.
