CHARGED WITH KNIFING HEARST

McCarren's Brooklyn Organization to be Investigated by Democratic State Committee.

SENATOR IS VERY OUTSPOKEN.

If Opportunity Presents Itself, He Will Repeat What He Said About Hearst.

New York, Nov. 9ff-The Democratic state committee met today and by a vote of 30 to 13 adopted a resolution providing for an investigation of conduct of the Kings county Democratic state organization, headed by State Senator Patrick H. McCarren, during the campaign just closed.

A delegation of Brooklyn Democrats, headed by Patrick Hayes, warden of the Kings county penitentiary and a former leader of one of the assembly districts included in McCarren's senatorial district, preferred charges against the senator and the Kings county committee. It was alleged that McCarren had "knifed" the head of the ticket and urged his followers to do the

The state committee also took steps to defend any action that may be taken by the Republicans to overthrow the pluralities which seem to exist in favor of the Democratic candidates on the state ticket from lieutenant governor down, Lewis Stuyvesant Chanler, the Democratic candidate for lieutenant governor; William Schuyler Jackson of Buffalo, the Democratic candidate for attorney general; Chairman W. J. Con-ners, who presided, and Norman E. Mack of Buffalo, Democratic national committeemen, were among those pres-

Warden Hayes and his associates re-Warden Hayes and his associates remained with the committee for 40 minutes, and during that time there were frequent outbursts of applause. The delegation asked that Senator McCarren be relieved from further service on the committee. It was declared by the spokesman that "McCarren's place is with the Republicans." The petition which was presented declared, among other things, that McCarren openly advocated the election McCarren openly advocated the election of the nominees of the Republican party and used the election machinery and

and used the election machinery and the Kings county committee to accom-plish the defeat of the regular Demo-cratic candidate for governor. It was asserted that the action of Senator McCarren and the Kings county committee "destroyed the Democratic organization of the county and made that organization simply and annex or ally of the Republican organ-ization."

In conclusion, the petition asked that not only Senator McCarren, but all the other members of the committee from

other members of the committee from Kings county, be removed.

McCarren declared, in reply, that at a meeting of the Kings county committee he had said some things about Mr. Hearst. "And if the opportunity presents," he declared, "I shall repeat them. When a fellow hits you on the jaw I do not believe in turning the other cheek. I believe in striking back, straight from the shoulder. If on another occasion I could make my statements regarding Mr. Hearst any more ments regarding Mr. Hearst any more emphatic I should certainly do so. Mr. Hayes, who is here opposing me, never voted a Democratic ticket in his life. I have never voted a Republican ticket. I deny that I knifed the ticket of the Buffalo convention. As to Mr. Hearst, I regard him as the boller, not myself. And the Kings county organization regarded him as a bolter."

CURRENCY REFORM High Grade IS NOW ASSURED

On Highest Authority it is Stated Congress Will Take up The Question.

SYSTEM IS NOW OUT OF DATE.

Progress of the Nation is Handicapped By It-Country to Be World's Creditor

Washington, D. C., Nov. 9 .- The unqualified declaration can be made that currency reform by Congress this winter is now certain. The statement comes from the highest authority in political and financial circles.

The vital question of providing an elastic currency system will be one of the first important measures acted upon at the coming session of the house of representatives

Agitation of the potential kind has had a salutary effect on political interests, and meetings are weekly being held between prominent New York financiers and politicians of national reputation. Their deliberations fore-

shadow conclusively the substitution of an adequate currency system for the present obsolete laws, which were intended to meet requirements of the country half a century ago, when it was, so to speak, in comparative infancy.
It is recognized that the progress of

it is recognized that the progress of the entire nation is handicaped by the existing monetary rules. The re-cent arbitrary advance in the discount rate of the Bank of England thorough-ly demonstrated how completely at the mercy of international finance is the United States under the present circum-stances. This realization has resulted stances. This realization has resulted in a determination by both political and financial interests to take aggressive action along the lines indicated.

It means that the United States will soon entirely liquidate its floating debt to Europe and become the creditor of the world, of which we have been the laughing stock because we unnecessarily submitted alternately to extortionate 106 per cent money during urgent crop-moving demands and to an unrenumerative 1% per cent rate when the agricultural requirements had been satisfied.

Taft came to Chicago today, inspected Fort Sheridan and after being entertained at a luncheon at the Auditorium tonight by a number of army officers left for Fort Leavenworth, Kan. While in Chicago Seey. Taft said that his present tour of inspection of the forts was to determine if the smaller ones could not be merged with the larger ones.

"My visit to Chicago," said he, "has nothing to do with an alleged charge against Col. Pitcher for alleged abuse of colored troops. I came to look over the condition of the fort and to see if it camnot be enlarged sufficiently for a brigade fort instead of a regimental one as at present. It is sufficiently large for the increase and the change may be made within a short time."

Regarding the Cuban situation he said: "Things there are moving fairly well. It is hard to say, however, when the United States troops will be removed from the island. One thing is certain, and that is that such a step will not be taken until peace in that country is assured. The people must show us they can and will govern themselves and will refrain from Internal strife. When that is done and we are satisfied, then it will be time to talk of removing the troops. It may be soon and may be not. They may be needed in some other place. Cuba is a fine country if rightly governed and cared for."

CUBAN LIBERALS ANXIOUS FOR OFFICE.

Havana, Nov. 9.—A determined effort to induce Gov. Magoon to begin a general distribution of offices among the members of the Liberal party was made this afternoon when a sub-committee appointed by the Liberal meeting Thursday hight composed of Juan Gualaterto Gomez, Demetric Castillo, Jose J. Monteagudo, Alfrede Zayas and Carlos Garcia Y. Velez, held a two hours' conference with the governor. The result of the conference is not known. On leaving the palace, however, Gen. Velez said the interview was highly satisfactory and that Gov. Magoon assured the committee that he would continue the reforms in the municipal government and that an election would be held in June. Gen. Velez evaded the question as to what reply Gov. Magoon made to the specific demand for offices.

Gov. Magoon said that he did not consider it appropriate to make any statement with regard to the conference in anticipation of the sub-committee's report. It is generally known, however, that he did not respond to the pressure and make the desired appointments.

While the committee on appointments did not meet tonight the report of the result of the conference with Gov. Magoon, there was a meeting at the Liberal club attended by 200 members of the party, who took part in the recent insurrection. The meeting manifested its strong disapprobation of the governor's course in not filling vacancles with Liberals and resolved that if the demands of the party were not promptly complied with to arrange an anti-Magoon demonstration in the form of a parade and mass meeting, the later to pass resolutions appealing to President Roosevelt to recall Gov. Magoon. Furthermore, the meeting appointed a committee to call upon Gov. Magoon tomorrow and demand the reinstatement of Juan R. O'Farrill, former Liberal mayor of Havana.

SIEMSEN ARRAIGNED. Siemsen Arraigned.

San Francisco, Nov. 9.—John Siensen, alias Simpson, and Louis Dabner, his companion, in a series of crimes, were formially charged with the murder today. It is for the murder of Mr. Munakata, the Japanese banker, that both men will be arraigned in police court tomorrow.

The authorities took the first step today to secure the release of Dodwell, alias Sutten, who was sent to the penitentiary for 50 years for the holdup of Dr. T. B. W. Leland, a crime to which Siensen and Dabner have both confessed.


