#### NEW NEW YORK INS. LAW.

Albany, N. Y., April 2.—The first of the 10 bills proposed by the special investigating committee as the result of its investigation of life insurance of its investigation of life insurance conditions is now a law. Gov. Higgins this afternoon affixed his signature to the bill which postponed until Nov. 15 the annual elections of the New York Life, Mutual Life of New York, Mutual Reserve of New York and Security Mutual of Binghampton—the four purely mutual life insurance com-panies incorporated under the laws of this state. It does not affect the Equitable Life Assurance society, which is a stock company. In sign-ing the bill the governor issued a memorandum sharply criticizing the memorandum sharply criticizing the directors whom he thus legislated from office.

Once of the most important effects of the act is that it invalidates every proxy hitherto secured, whether by the companies themselves, by Thomas W. Lawson of Boston or any one else.
