Veteran Editor of Washington Star Ends Successful Career.

SIXTY YEARS A TOILER.

Commenced at Bottom of the Ladder As a Reporter and Climbed Steadily to Its Topmost Rung

Los Angeles, Cal., Feb. 21.-Crosby Stuart Noyes, editor-in-chief of the Washington Evening Star, died at 5:30 o'clock this evening at the Hotel Raymond at Pasadena, after an illness dating from his arrival here three weeks ago.

Complications which became pronounced late in the afternoon exhausted the strength and vitality which he had displayed during the past fortnight and which in spite of his 53 years had astonished and encouraged the physi-

astonished and encouraged the physi-clans in charge. At bis bedside when the end came were all of the members of his family, including his wife, three sons, Theo-dore W. Noyes, associate editor of the Star; Frank E. Noyes, editor of the Chicago Record-Herald, and president of the Associated Press, and Thomas B. Noyes, manager of the Washington Star, and his daughter, Mrs. George W. Boyd of Philadelphia. In addition, Fred W. Hall of San Francisco, a son-in-law, was present.

Fred W. Hall of San Francisco, a son-in-law, was present. The death of Mr. Noyes followed an attack of grip contracted while travel-ing in California. Mrs. Noyes, the widow, suffered an attack of grip at the same time and is tonight somewhat ill as the result of the shock. Arrangements for the funeral are not yet complete, but it has been deter-mined that the remains will be interred in the family vault at Rock Creek cometery, Washington.

Warren Stone and William G. Lee Argue Their Side By Saying What

Rights Belong to Corporations.

Cleveland, Feb. 21.-Warren Stone, grand chief of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, today made the following statement in connection with the reported purpose of some railroad companies to order a general reduction in the wages of employes:

"The threatened reduction of the wages of employes in train service is absolutely unjustified from any point of view. Their pay is based on mileage basis, practically piece work, and they are only paid when these services are performed. Wages of employes in train performed. Wages of employes in train service fall parallel with the shrinkage in business, plus increased living ex-penses away from home is about 15 per cent, while at the present reduced rate of \$70-which has to be met by hundreds, under present conditions-that expense will increase to at least 20 per cent of earnings, because they are held away from the home terminal until there is a full tonnage train to be handled, making a total automatic reduction in wages from 60 to 70 per cent.

"The roads are getting the same re-turn in freight receipts for the serv-ice rendered as they did when the business was good, and there is no consistency in asking men to accept fur-ther reductions than result from the present business shrinkage, and the full power of the Brotherhood of Lo-comctive Engineers will be used if necessary to prevent any further reduc-tion, because it would be absolutely unjust

GRAND MASTER TALKS.

William G. Lee. assistant grand mas-ter of the Brotherhood of Rallroad Trainmen, speaking on the same sub-ject, dictated the following:

"The wage workers have not had a thing to do with this panic and loss of business except to suffer from the mis-management of some employers and business except to suffer from the mis-management of some employers and speculators who blundered in the game of dollars on Wall street. If he works he orduces just as much per hour as he ever did. His living expenses are just as high as before. "All classes of trainmen are paid by the mile or trip; and a reduction of miles, runs or trips made means a re-duction of the amount paid for by tho employers. wy s

duction of the amount paid for by the engloyers. There can be no good argument pre-sented why trainmen should receive lower trip or mileage rates for miles business requires it. Corporations never carry an overload of labor, but labor is usually compelied to carry an overload of capitalization. This no foult of labor that finan-ters play with their money and lose, nor is it the business of labor to suf-fer the losses sustained when its om-ployers reach too far into the fire and get their fingers burnes. "Our principal business now is to maintain the present standard of fir-ing which means to hold to the pres-ent standard of wages, and unless all space fail railinead employers will op-pose to the the bitter end any attempt to reduce wages."
