Dear Sir—It was the policy in early days for our people to support one another in trade and barter, not buy anything from those not on our faith, unless it was not to be gained of our brethren. The result of this was that nearly every one of our people who came here as barter in merchandise were allowed enemies of the "Mormon people, doubting freely of the wisdom made of the people to be wise was detrimental to their welfare and prosperity. This policy has been urged upon the people by leaders more or less continually since we first came here to the

defence, cannot be questioned. Why it has been generally overlooked and ignored out of the great mass of things played by our people, or by other people. As a matter of well known and generally admitted fact, the most important territory in the shape of political movements, and which has been used in urging measures against the Government, has been elsewhere, has been gotten from people. With a few honorable exceptions, the most of the putative merchants who have grown up in the United States, and in merchandising among the last forty days, have spent all their influence and the time and money of the United States, in their own private business, in families and in the character of the people to be lived among. the policy of those who have inaugurated the "Mormon crusade" 1838-4. This has really been the object of all the persecutions suffered by the Latter-day Saints—but not before openly declared.

The matter now resolves itself to a question of vital importance every Latter-day Saint who has been persecuted by the world, his family, his kindred and his religion at heart—Shall we spend our money in building up and making rich those who are doing all they can to carry on their mission against us, and support one another, and let us outside alone? Shall we adopt the universal law of all creation, the law of self-preservation, or shall we go on as heretofore and make no use of our own knowledge. It will be used to our injury?

Cannot we be as wise and considerate as our outside neighbors? Have we not many of them transgressors of the law? Do we not support a "Mormon" store or immoral trial institution, even when we can do better with their money? Have we not done so?

I call to mind an incident that I learned only recently. A "Mormon" firm offered to supply a certain article for \$10 per dozen. The money was spent for the same class of goods at a Gentile store for \$20 a dozen.

Many, I know, excuse themselves in saying, "Well, they are not 'Mormons'." They understand the "Mormon" trademark. It is out of our reason to suppose this to be true in any case but a few. It is not true in any case. If he has a family he cannot live cheaper, nor will he be satisfied to get rich slower than the "Mormon" trafficker. And a Gentile store will not sell cheaper than its rivals. Where then is there "Mormonism"?

It is no longer idle inaugurated to support one another. Can we not call to mind the circumstances of the Latter-Saints? Many hundreds of thousands of men, women and children, out of house and home, and been thrown out of good business circumstances because they dared believe in and assert the truth of Mormonism.
