Neither of these gentlemen, however, knew of what they spoke when they at-tempted to discuss Mormon aff ire. They were only recent importations into the Territory, and the denunciations of the one and the editorials of the other appeared children to those conversant with all the facts.

To be sure they have pretended to be friendly, and tolerant, but whenever their business has been threatened by the withdrawal of "Mormon" trade they have been the first to cry against the "intolerance of the Mormons." the "little ence of the Priesthood," etc."
