WASHINGTON, 22.—The debate on the Centennial appropriation bill was further continued by Teese, Jones, O'Key, Morey, Lapham, Dunde, Monroe and Kason in favor of the bill, and by Baker, of Ind., Caldwell, Savage and Holman against it.
