DEPOSIT'S INCREASING. Inquiries at the banks brings out that deposits are increasing at the fate of at least 5 per cent per month, an intelligent estimate placing the round figures as to the aggregate of deposits at from \$25,000,000 to \$25,000,000. There is a general feeling in all banking cir-cles, as the sense of security becomes more firmly established in the com-munity. Money is freely in demand at the usual rates of interest, the var-lety of applicants for loans increasing as time goes on.

CONDITIONS IN EAST. An eastern letter received at the banks yesterday, says relative to gen-eral banking conditions: The general outlook of the market cannot be called satisfactory, the ten-dency seemingly being towards lower prices. Briefly stated the situation is this: After a rise lasting several months, which overdiscounted all pos-sible business recovery, a reaction was due. The panic has been more severe in its effects, especially upon th rail-roads, than was expected. General busi-ness, though improving, has not rail-ied as promptly or as fully as was ex-pected; nor have the crops met early calculations, even though they turn out better than last year. It becomes necessary, therefore, to modify extrava-sant expectations which had so much to do with the spring and summer rise. It must also be remembered that this phenomenal advance would have been absolutely impossible but for abnormal-ly cheap money, which meant dear stocks and inflation for, which there is usually, a penalty some day. This infomation will be combined with other statistics of a similar nature to throw light on the general topic of the conservation of life and property through the preven-tion of fires, for the use of the commis-sion when it meets here in December, to prepare its report for President Roose-Hon. SHERMAN ATTACKS BRYAN'S SILVER RECORD.

New York, Sept. 25 .- In an address today before the Commercial Travelers'

New York, Sept. 25.-In an address to-day before the Commercial Travelers' Sound Money lengue, which was formed in 1858 and has been revived for every presidential campaign since then, James S. Sherman, the Republican candidate for the vice presidency, today made a spirited attack on Mr. Bryan's free sil-ver record. The country, he said, should not tull liself into fancied security by what he called the tactrul silence of the Democratic presidental candidate on this subject in this campaign. He argued that the election of Mr. Bryan, "should insanity overtake the people and lead to such a result of the present campaign, would enganger the gold standard, for no one can say that the pled piper of Nebraska, if elected, would not wander off into the cloudy dreamland of his fi-mancial vagaries." — Thereafter Mr. Sherman's speech was an eulogy of the gold standard, to the establishment and maintenance of which by the Republican party he ascribed the prosperity that followed the victory over Bryan in his first campaign.
