

IMPROVEMENT ALL ALONG LINE

The Local Commercial Situation Shows Steady Advance as Fall Season Opens.

SECURITY IS ESTABLISHED.

Deposits are Increasing in Salt Lake At the Rate of Five Per Cent A Month.

The local commercial situation is one of steady improvement. In banking circles, the special interest lies in the annual convention next week of the American Bankers' association in Denver, which will be largely attended by financiers from all over the Pacific slope. A dozen Salt Lake bankers will attend. The Salt Lake Clearing House association, through its officers will welcome the California delegation to the convention early tomorrow afternoon, and escort the visitors about the city in automobiles between trains. Had they time, the Californians would have been given a special organ recital in the tabernacle. Salt Lake bankers are much like to see the 1909 convention come to Salt Lake, but the indications point strongly toward Washington, D. C., as the place, though Utah men are not without hope of seeing their city selected in the not distant future.

DEPOSITS INCREASING.

Inquiries at the banks bring out that deposits are increasing at the rate of at least a percent per month, an intelligent estimate placing the round figures as to the aggregate of deposits at from \$25,000,000 to \$28,000,000. There is general feeling in all banking circles, as the season of security becomes more firmly established in the community. Money is freely in demand at the usual rates of interest, the variety of applications for loans increasing as time goes on.

CONDITIONS IN EAST.

An eastern letter received at the bank yesterday says relative to general banking conditions: "The general outlook of the market cannot be called satisfactory, the tendency seemingly being towards lower prices. Briefly stated the situation is this: After a rise lasting several months, which overdiscounted all possible business recovery, a reaction was due. The panic has been so severe in its effects, especially upon the railroads, than was expected. General business, though improving, has not rallied as promptly or as fully as was expected. The general feeling is one of uncertainty, even though they turn out better than last year, it becomes necessary, therefore, to modify extravagant expectations which had so much to do with the selling and buying. It must also be remembered that this phenomenal advance would have been absolutely impossible but for abnormal cheap money, which meant a dear stock and bond market, from which there is usually a penalty some day. Again we are now in the height of a presidential campaign; and though there is nothing seriously disturbing in the present contest, it affords no material on which to prolong the late bull market. The tariff is sure to be a subject of active discussion, and it is not quieting to business interests. Besides uncertainty is always unsettling, and it may be good politics to give the market a scare, which can be readily and profitably done. It is not likely to coincide with the plans of the chief market manipulators. For some time to come both prudence and discrimination will be necessary in the buying of stocks, fluctuations, however, will be wide and frequent until after the election, thereby making it a good, quick trading market."

SHINGLES ADVANCE.

The lumber trade reports no change in the past week, with the exception perhaps of shingles, which show a slight advance from outside sources, a further advance at most any time. The opening of the Portland gateway, which goes into effect Oct. 17, has a tendency to keep prices stationary. Portland is the market from which this territory draws its supplies, and but for the coming opening of this gateway, would send up prices materially. So this is a sort of governor in regulating prices. The trade reports sale of considerable lumber that is going into bungalow houses.

FAMINE IN FRUIT JARS.

The hardware trade reports good times. There is an unusual demand for fruit jars all over the city owing to the unusually heavy fruit supply; the supply of jars is entirely incommensurate to the demand. People have been buying lightly this summer, as the times required a tightening of the family purse strings and the fact that there would be such a surplus of fruit was not understood; so now when every housewife would go to canning there are not enough jars. The receipt of jars from outside sources this week was only two cars, of 100 to 150 gross each, when dealers say 15 or even 18 car loads would not be too much. Prices are a trifle higher than last year. There is also a good demand for beet cultivators and supplies, as well as for chains, bolts, heavy hinges for beet racks, heavy harnesses, whipstocks and latches. Saddlery is a very fair seller ahead of last year, as ranchers are now starting to round up their stock preparatory to removal to the winter ranges. There is an immense traffic in sporting goods loaded on shells for shot guns and guns themselves as the duck season will shortly be "on." Football goods are in strong demand, with boxing gloves and gymnasium shoes and equipment generally. There is a fine movement in builders' hardware, as there are many new houses just being finished up and calling for finishing hardware. Ranges and heaters are selling very well, as are also household goods in tin, granite and iron ware generally.

WHOLESALE DRY GOODS.

The local wholesale dry goods trade reports as usual a steady business. Dry goods ordered last summer, being shipped to retailers and the smaller jobbers all over the intermountain region. The class of stock being handled includes largely dark flannels and general staples. Jobbers in the report recent trade in the west. Sidebands in stable prints are strong and are being bought in all parts of the country. In the east, the season has been the end of the year. Some hams have been ordered, and some are being sold. Trade continues light on duck, awning clothes, heavy tickings, denims, and other heavy cottons. Wholesalers report a brisk demand from retailers for quick shipments in underwear and hosiery. Fleeced underwear shows an improved demand. In hosiery, agents report that colored half hose is coming in stronger as a seller for spring delivery. Staple black gauze effects are in first place, and in cottons, which are expected to hold through next spring and summer. In silks, buyers show an increased interest, which strengthens prices. Satins have been given a prominent place in all the new lines for next year. The silk petticoat has come to stay for a while, as it is decidedly popular. There is a steady call for linens and burlaps have advanced sharply.

RETAIL OUTLOOK.

In the retail trade, dealers report everything satisfactory, with the fall business starting in well. The openings are still on, which bring out the interesting and pleasing fact that for really fine goods in a great variety of styles, patterns, designs and make up of material, the present season has no superior in the past. Designers are more kaleidoscopic and versatile than ever, and improved facilities in manufacturing have increased the quality of fabrics without enhancing the cost of consumers. A look at the show windows of Salt Lake dry goods houses on Main street is a study in elegance and ingenuity of arrangement in displaying strikingly beautiful effects with such lines of goods as have not been seen here before. Dealers report excellent sales in broad cloths plain and in shadow stripes; also satins which are shown with elegant effects. Persian patterned silks are in steady demand, for they certainly elegant fabrics, particularly adapted to shirt waists. Tailor-made suits are selling well, being shown off to advantage by living models. Linens are coming to the front, noticeable in embroideries and hand worked stuffs. In Renaissance patterns, Wash dresses for waistings are good sellers. Millinery too is strong and hats are in demand to match with suits.

GOV. HASKELL HAS RESIGNED

Did Not Desire to be Responsible For Any Embarrassment To The Democratic Party.

STRONG FOR BRYAN AND KERN.

Admits Resignation Direct Result of Charges Made by Hearst and Prest. Roosevelt.

Chicago, Sept. 25.—Gov. Charles N. Haskell at midnight tonight resigned as treasurer of the Democratic national committee. His resignation was announced by himself three hours after his arrival in Chicago from Guthrie, Okla., and after he had conferred with officials of the Democratic national headquarters here. In giving out his decision Mr. Haskell, in response to a question, declared he did not desire to be responsible for any embarrassment which might result to the Democratic party by his retaining the office of treasurer.

LETTER OF RESIGNATION.

The resignation of Gov. Haskell, as forwarded to Chairman Mack tonight, reads: "Hon. Norman E. Mack, Chairman Democratic National Committee, New York City:

"My Dear Sir: In pursuance of information at your date for return here, when I went home before, I assumed I would find you here upon my return today. I now learn that you will be detained in the east until Tuesday and as I must be home Monday I leave tomorrow."

"Since the president and his cabinet have joined forces with Mr. Hearst and three Wall street bankers to make a personal fight against the not-withstanding the president in his answer to Mr. Bryan abandoned his charge about Ohio Standard Oil cases, yet by all the means at the command of the government and the millions of Hearst and his Wall street allies, they persist in vicious unwarranted and untruthful attacks on me personally. I welcome the rail and wheel with all the vigor at my command. I shall treat them all as private citizens and subject to the penalties of the law which they merit. In this I know I shall have the aid of my neighbors at home for all proper purposes; but my time must be free from other demands here."

"Mr. Bryan is full of hope for the election of Mr. Bryan and Kern. Honest government and rule by the people is at stake. Important beyond any battle at the polls in the last generation is the pending contest. I would not for one moment consent to any such way connected with the committee, therefore hereby tender my resignation as treasurer of the Democratic national committee, that not the slightest test of my own could in any way be used by the president to cloud the sky and shield our opponents from discussing the real issues and laying bare the Republican duplicity to the people."

"Sincerely yours,"

"C. N. HASKELL."

WHAT CAUSED RESIGNATION.

That his resignation is the direct result of the charges made against him by William R. Hearst and President Roosevelt he also admitted. At the same time, however, he said that he intended to admit that any of the charges were true.

When Mr. Haskell arrived in Chicago at 9 o'clock tonight he declared he had no resignation and that Mr. Bryan had not asked him to resign. Speaking to a crowd of reporters he said, "If you have any questions to ask put them on paper." He then went from this station to the Democratic headquarters at the Auditorium annex. When a list of questions was handed to him he retired to his room, saying he would give out any answers that he could. He was closeted for a long time with National Committeeman Martin J. Wade of Iowa, and Joseph Daniels, chairman of the Democratic press committee.

It was midnight when Mr. Haskell reappeared from the room. He held in his hands a written resignation addressed to Norman E. Mack, and the answers to the questions which had been given him.

"I have my answer," he said. "They will explain themselves." After giving an affirmative reply to the questions whether he had resigned, but denying that Mr. Bryan had asked for the resignation, the questions and answers he read as follows:

"Do you know whether Mr. Bryan knew of the charges made against you by Mr. Hearst before you were appointed treasurer?"

"I do not see how he could have."

"Do you think your further connection with the campaign, regardless of the truth or falsity of the charges, would tend to embarrass Mr. Bryan or injure his chances?"

"It might. At any rate I would not like good citizens to think any embarrassment in the light of the honest people against the special interests."

"Do you intend to reply to President Roosevelt?"

"I have not done so yet."

"Do you intend to renew your demand for an investigation of the charges?"

"How can I? Roosevelt admits that he did not tell the truth."

In answer to a series of questions as to his relation to the Citizens' alliance, said to have been organized at Muskogee, Okla., to fight the local labor unions, Mr. Haskell denied that the alliance was ever organized. In reply to questions concerning the Standard Oil company, he said he had no former dealings of ever having anything to do with that company.

FIGHTING FIRES.

Conservation Committee Trying to Find Out What It Costs Country.

Washington, Sept. 26.—The national conservation committee is trying to find out what it costs the country to fight fires. The geological survey, which is conducting this particular branch of the inquiry for the commission, is sending out letters to city officials all over the country asking for data on additional cost of city water supplies for fire protection, and beyond what is necessary for domestic use. This information will be combined with other statistics of a similar nature to throw light on the general topic of the conservation of life and property through the prevention of fires, for the use of the commission when it meets here in December, to prepare its report for President Roosevelt.

SHERMAN ATTACKS BRYAN'S SILVER RECORD.

New York, Sept. 25.—In an address today before the Commercial Travelers' Sound Money League, which was formed in 1898 and has been revived for every presidential campaign since then, James B. Sherman, president of the league, for the vice presidency, today made a spirited attack on Mr. Bryan's free silver record. The country, he said, should nullify itself into financial security by what he called the tactful silence of the Democratic presidential candidate on this subject in this campaign. He argued that the election of Mr. Bryan, "should instantly overtake the people and lead to such a result of the gold standard, for no one can say that the pied piper of Nebraska, if elected, would not wander into the cloudy dreamland of his financial vagaries."

Thereafter Mr. Sherman's speech was an eulogy of the gold standard to the establishment and maintenance of which by the Republican party he ascribed the prosperity that followed the victory of Mr. Bryan in his first campaign.

"One of Mr. Bryan's most quoted sayings," said Mr. Sherman, "is that politics is the art of getting things done. The gold standard has slain its tens of thousands. In his many changes he has not given up his hatred of sound money. He has never not a word to appointed question in Chicago whether he would maintain the gold standard if elected."

"The country cannot afford to put sound money in jeopardy. It cannot afford to trust the gold standard to its present custodian, the Democratic party, from it have been and are too rich and manifold to be imperiled for the profit of a partisan leader."
