ASOUITH PROMISES OLD AGE PENSIONS

British Chancellor Sets Aside for This Purpose Next Year Seven And a Half Million Dollars.

REDUCING NATIONAL DEBT

It is Being Done Rapidly-Proposes Increase of Duties to Compensate For Loss of Income Tax.

Lonion, April 18 .- Chancellor of the Excheques Herbert Asquith in an able two hours' speech today delivered the hudget statement. If not rivalling the great financial achievements of Gladstone and Harcourt, it has the merit of exceeding simplicity. Judging by the debate, the statement will meet with a greater degree of general approval and less sectional antagonism than usually falls to the lot of budget statements

The most persistent complaints emanate from the extreme section of the Labor party, which is disappointed at the postponement of the pension scheme and the absence of any direct scheme and the absence of any direct relief in the taxation of the working classes. James Kelt Hardie calls it a "brutal budget" and declares his belief that the government has no intention of dealing with this question during its lifetime.

That there is some justification for the workers' complaints may be gathered from the fact that in the lobbies of the house the statement was generally characterized as a "middle class budget."

Mr. Asquith had the good fortune of dealing with a year of unusual prosperity in national finances. The national debt is being reduced rapidly, and in this connection the chancellor announced that the government held it as an obligation to "reinstate and improve the national credit."

Briefly, instead of the estimated deficit of \$230,000 for 1906-07, Mr. Asquith has realized a surplus of \$26,995,000, while for 1907-08 he estimates the surplus at \$17,175,000.

His proposals are not for a reduction in direct taxation, but provide relief from the burden of the income tax by preferential treatment of earnord incomes below \$10,000 a year to the extent of 6 cents on every \$5. To compensate for the loss from this measure he proposes that the duties be increased.

The unusually brief debate was devoid of any particularly interesting feature. Most of the speakers complimented the chancellor on his able speech and the Conservatives had little criticism to offer. Austin Chamberlain, Liberal Unionist, declared Mr. Asquith had disclosed how limited were the resources of faxation under the present system and how inadequate the present basis of taxation to provide means for the reforms which all parties desired to see undertaken. James Ramsay MacDonald, Labor and Socialist member, voiced the disappointment of the Labor party at the failure to introduce a pension scheme, and declared the relief from the income tax would benefit only the middle classes.

John E. Redmond and other Nationalists said privately that they were dissatisfied that there was no change in indirect taxation, which presses very heavily upon Ireland. The unusually brief debate was de-

Mexico City, April 18.—The first press dispatch received here from Chilapa, one of the towns destroyed by Sunday's earthquake, says 33 bodies have already been removed from the ruins, and that 779 injured persons are being cared for. The government is organizing relief as apidly as possible. Chilapa has a pop-

fation of about 9,000. Another dispatch from Chilpancingo avs another earthshock was felt there Relief committees are being formed

Relief committees are being formed in Mexico City. The nearest railroad station to Chilipaneingo is Iguala, on the Balsas river, and to get supplies into the stricken district it is necessary to convey them on horseback, a journey of three or four days.

Damage from the earthquake in Mexico City is much more extensive than was at first supposed. There is universal regret over the damage to the great cathedral here, which is one of the most curious in the world.

Tells Connecticut Assembly He Prefers Blue Laws to Some Yellow Ones.

FINDS ORIGINAL MUGWUMP.

Hartford, Conn., April 8 .- William J. Bryan was the guest of the state assembly at noon today. He came to Connecticut to lecture in this city and Danbury under the auspices of the Democratic state central committee. Leaving New York on a morning train, Mr. Bryan was met at Bridgeport by a delegation of the Democratic members of the assembly. At the capital he was received by Gov. Woodruff and met many prominent men of the state. At noon the senate joined the house of representatives in convention and heard on address by Mr. Bryan. Later Mr. Bryan was dined by the Democratic state central committee.

Mr. Bryan spoke for an hour and a half upon representative government. He said that while waiting for the time to speak he had visited the state library and found a copy of the blue laws, and he wanted to say he much preferred the blue laws of Connecticut to some yellow laws recently adopted to nother states. He did not understand it until he saw the chief's signature. This, he said, was a crooked mark, which wriggled around and zigzagged first one way and then another.

Referring to the mugwump in politics, Mr. Bryan said that after all, the best citizen is the one who votes as his con-

ory or said that after all, the best citizen is the one who votes as his conscience dictates.

The house chamber held the largest audience in its history, the people also being massed solidly in the outer corvitors.

The dinner given in honor of Mr. Bryan by the state central committee was a jurely hon-partisan affair. Among the guests were many Republicans, including Gov. Woodruff. In an address Gov. Woodruff said it was Mr. Bryan's ambition to become president of the United States and "he won't be happy until he gets it. I wish he was governor of Connecticut; it might cure him of his political ambitions. I would like to see him tackle our lobby."

The governor introduced Mr. Bryan as one of the foremost men in America and a man who held the good will and respect of every true American.
