Determined to Suicide and Did.

Murdered for Money. Chicago, Oct. 14.—Murdered for the purpose of robbery is believed to have been the fate of P. H. Konzen, a wealthy justice of the peace of New Hampton, Ia., who disappeared on his way to this city during Centennial weak. The police were asked today to solve the mystery surrounding his dis-appearance. Konzen, who is 35 years of age, left his home Sept. 29 and came to Chicago to attend the Centen-nial celebration, after which he in-tended to sell here a large piece of prop-erty in South Dakota. His friends be-lieve that he made the sale and re-ceived in payment a large amount of money for which he was held up and probably murdered. Kansas City, Mo., Oct. 14.—After one unsuccessful attempt to kill himself, W. A. Atwood, aged 50, a blacksmith from Everest, Kan., committed suicide here today in a sensational manner. First he leaped from the Fifth street via-duct to the railway yards. 50 feet be-low. Although badly hurt, he was able to walk away unassisted, and before any one could reach the spot Atwood, kneeling beside a passing freight train, placed his head under the wheels.
