

MURDOCH LEADS OVER WALLACE

Unofficial Canvass Gives Him 46 Votes More Than Fusion Candidate.

OFFICIAL CANVASS MONDAY.

Many Bets Made on the Two Men and Bookies Are Holding Money For the Final Count.

In revising the election returns, several discrepancies appeared in the tables published by the newspapers yesterday. After the corrections were made, the unofficial figures give James M. Murdoch, the Republican candidate, 46 more votes than were cast for William R. Wallace, the Citizens-Democratic candidate. The chief error was in the first district. Mr. Murdoch received 180 votes instead of 17 votes and Mr. Wallace had 128 votes, instead of 129 votes. Mayor Bransford has given 180 votes and he should have been credited with 295 votes.

There were several other small corrections made in the table after a careful canvass and the total vote for each now stands as follows:

The election board will meet Monday at noon, when the official count will be made. Several of the returns had to be sent back to the judges late yesterday afternoon and the sworn statements of the results will be returned to the city recorder this afternoon.

On account of the inaccuracies in the table on account of incomplete returns, many of the wagers are being held until the official count is made Monday. The bookies are holding the stakes they have awaiting the official canvass. The betting on the relative positions of Murdoch and Wallace was quite heavy. It is estimated that there will be change hands on these two candidates.

UNCLE SAM NEEDS EXPERTS.

Chemists and Engineers to be Sought in Civil Service Tests.

Junior chemists and junior engineers are wanted by the government for service in the geological survey, and the announcement is made that examinations for these positions will be held in this city Nov. 22-24. The salary for the junior chemists will be from \$960 to \$1,200 a year and for the junior engineers from \$840 to \$1,080 a year. Applicants for the position of chemist must have had educational training equivalent to a good college training in chemistry. The vacancies to be filled in the engineer grade are in three distinct lines of employment. The first is the testing of structural material, second, testing fuels; third, investigation into the methods of mining fuels and structural materials and related products.

BANQUET AT NEW STATION.

Dining Car and Hotel Department Hosts to Newspapermen.

The dining car and hotel department of the Harriman line knows how to entertain. In this line it does nothing by halves; and it did the handsome thing last evening on the occasion of the formal opening of the cafe at the new station.

Union passenger station in this city, where representatives of the Salt Lake press were given an elaborate banquet in the fine new dining apartments in the north wing of the station. Supt. E. E. Lewis of this branch of the railroad service was unable to be present, but Asst. Supt. F. W. Gentsch, son of the former Supt. of the Pacific Express company in this city, did the honors of host, and Miss Kitty Gillin, formerly of the Yellowstone service, served the viands.

The table service was irreproachable, with white and red carnation decorations, with the following menu: Course of caviar, oysters on the deep shell, consommé de volaille, celery, olives, broiled trout, trout-mousseline, serpentine potatoes, braised sweetbreads a la Victor Hugo, French peas, roast duck, guinea fowl, oyster dressing, mashed potatoes, fresh crab salad-mayonnaise, vanilla ice cream with assorted cakes, Roquefort cheese with Bent's crackers, cafe noir, and wines, cigarettes and cigars. That the courtesy was appreciated was evident from the way the viands disappeared, and the calm, imperturbable, serene and gastronomically philosophic attitudes, which that enshrouded the most impressive scene.

The guests were shown over the culinary plant, which is considered one of the most complete in the entire service. It includes the largest sized and latest improved hotel range, aluminum steam table, broiler, baking and roasting ovens, warming closets, special washing apparatus, in short every device known to the business for speedily and thoroughly work. The store rooms and pantries, great ice boxes and refrigerators are models of their class. Fred C. Harlow is the chef with 16 years experience to back him, four years being with the Harriman service. The local manager is Thomas E. Fitzgerald, with the Short Line for six years, and two years in the Yellowstone service. Lewis and Gentsch have their headquarters at Ogden, where there is a special building devoted to the hotel and dining car service. Their jurisdiction includes both of the Pacific and the Short Line roads.

THIEF JUMPS FROM TRAIN.

Typical Rural Sheriff From Kansas Loses Prisoner Near Home Town.

James F. Young, 23 years of age, who was arrested in front of the Wilson hotel last Sunday afternoon by Sheriff S. P. Heck of Salina, Kan., on a charge of stealing \$74 from John Richie, a Salina contractor, deliberately jumped out of the car window on a train going at a high speed, near Ellsworth, Kan., and escaped, according to advices received here. spent \$1,000 in railroad fare before he captured the alleged thief. The limit of the law and his prisoner were only a few miles from home when Young made his daring leap to liberty.
