There are thousands of desperate men in the country who are ripe for any species of wickedness. The bitterness of political hate is greatly intensified just now, and there are many, doubtless, who would not hesitate at any deed to carry their points. Assassination is openly threatened, and coolly talked about, in some papers, as though such a crime were meritorious. Poison is more easily used than the pistol or is more easily used than the pistol or the dagger, and without the same risks to the assassin.

If it were not before the eyes of the people, and they were familiar with it, they would not believe that such a shange could have taken place in our nation in the few years that have elapsed since 1861. Scarcely a single person could be made to believe before the rebellion that there was any probability of the Union being severed, notwithstanding the expressed determination and threats of leading Southern men. The Queen, to-day, in the presence of a vast multitude of spectators, laid with imposing ceremonies the corner stone of St. Thomas' Hospital, which is to be built on the Thames, immediately op-posite the Houses of Parliament. Her Majesty was attended by the Prince and Princess of Wales and other mem-bers of the royal family, and by the members of the Cabinet. The chief officers of the corporation of the city of London presented an address to the Queen declaring their profound sympathy with Her Majesty for the injuries received by Prince Alfred at the hands of an assassin, and expressing their detestation of the attempted crime.
