

GREAT SIGNAL SYSTEM.

U. S. Coast From Maine to Texas Under Close Watch.

NO SURPRISE BY A HOSTILE FLEET.

Every Movement Of Ships Can Be Reported Quickly—2,500 Men Employed.

Washington, May 23.—After several weeks of work along the entire stretch from the Atlantic and Gulf coasts, the navy department has completed the most comprehensive and efficient system for observation of the approach of a hostile fleet that has ever been put into operation. A new bureau has been created for this purpose, known as the Central Signal System, which is to be established at the work of the naval signal stations. The system has the service of 2,500 men stationed along the coast from Maine to Texas, and is divided into three main divisions: the first, which is to be stationed at the coast signal stations, the second, which is to be stationed at the navy department, and the third, which is to be stationed at the navy department. 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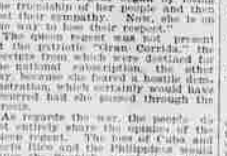

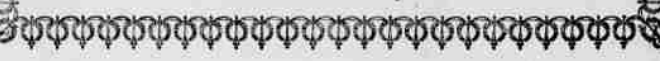
