therefore he would not take up the time in speech-making. The roll was called; quorum present. Prayer was offered by the chaplain.

Mr. S. R. Thurman moved for a committee of seven on resolutions and declaration of principles.

The motion was carried and the following were appointed by nomination from the house, viz.: S. R. Thurman, C. W. Penrose, F. S. Richardson, Joseph Barton, Rees R. Llewellyn, George Atkins and J. R. Winder.

On motion of Mr. A. Hatch a committee of three was appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Governor, to request him to call a special election, to be held on the same day as the regular Delegate election, to elect a Delegate for the unexpired term of the Forty-Seventh Congress. The chair appointed A. Hatch, Nathan Tanner and J. R. Murdoch said committee.

The convention then took a recess till 8:30 p. m.

BRIEF TELEGRAMS.

The President left Boston for Marshfield yesterday morning.

The Onondaga Indians of Wisconsin have formed a temperance society.

Ingalls Hall, the seat of Earl Shrewsbury, near Stafford, Eng., has been destroyed by fire.

The new steamship *Belgium*, built at Aberdeen for the American trade, was totally wrecked on her trial trip.

Eccles, Shorrock Brothers & Co., cotton spinners at Overdammer, Eng., will go into liquidation. Their liabilities are \$25,000.

The Treasury Department to-day purchased \$75,000 ounces of silver for the New Orleans, San Francisco and Philadelphia mints.

In negotiating with the Madagascar Embassy, France will claim the restoration of her sovereignty over the island of Madagascar, which belonged to her a century ago.

At Buffalo, a number of spurious silver dollars are in circulation. It is believed some of the German and Italian consuls, who recently arrived in New York are operating there.

Wilmot H. Ward, arrested Saturday on the charge of conspiracy to steal Government bonds and plates from the bureau of engraving and printing, was released on bail. Saller is still in jail.

A gas clerk has embezzled a large sum by making false footings in accounts from 1876 to 1881. A meeting of the finance committee of the city board, this afternoon, ordered an investigation.

At St. Petersburg it is persistently rumored that Count Tolstol, Minister of the Interior, and Bunge, Minister of Finance, will resign, and Count Peter Schouvaloff and Alasa will probably succeed them.

The annual report of the director of the mint, which was forwarded to the Secretary of the Treasury to-day, shows a decided increase in coinage for the 12 months ending June 30, 1882, over that of the previous year.

Wm. H. Vanderbilt writes a card denying the authenticity of the interview recently published in Chicago, in which he was alleged to have made very startling remarks in regard to the "hooked plate" road and the anti-monopolists.

The grand jury found an indictment against J. F. Brown, Adams House clerk and storekeeper, and P. A. Snell, dealer, arrested in Colorado yesterday, charging them with conspiracy to cheat the city by means of false bills for supplies furnished the almshouse.

The practice of opium smoking was introduced in Washington several months ago by the establishment of regular smoking dens, which are regarded as nuisances and injurious to health. Chief of Police Brooks has issued orders to have such places raided, and if possible suppressed.

Six horse vans filed up Broadway N. Y. yesterday in a procession, and backed up at the rear entrance to the general postoffice. They contained bags of mail matter which arrived by the steamer *Zephania*, yesterday. Two hundred and fifty of the bags of mail were bound for Australia, via San Francisco and New York.

The President reached Boston yesterday at 6:45, dined at the Hotel Brunswick with a committee of the city government, and later visited Boston Theatre and Globe Theatre. At the latter Madame Modjeska presented the President with a basket of flowers, and also gave one to General Butler, who occupied the opposite box. There was a perfect uproar of applause during the progress of these courtesies.
