New York April 2.—Miss Lena Kurley, who says she is the daughter of the postmaster general of the island of Barbados, has been excluded from landing in this country, not for lack of money, but because she is almost totally blind and entirely without friends or acquaintances here. She came to America to be treated by a specialist in Philadelphia, but was refused admission by a Miss Allen said to be the daughter of a wealthy Costa Rican planter arriving a few days ago on the steamer Caprice. PHILIPPINE CURRENCY ACT.

Col. Edwards Issue Circular Regarding Carrying It Out.

Washington, April 2.—Col. Edwards, chief of the bureau of insular affairs, has issued a circular announcing action looking to carrying out the Philippine currency act. It invites subscriptions for \$3,000,000 for the certificates of indebtedness of the government of the Philippines to be issued in coupon form in the denomination of \$1,000, dated May 1, 1903, bearing interest at the rate of 4 per cent, payable quarterly, and to be redeemable at New York in one year after date of issue for gold coin of the United States. These certificates are exempt from the payment of all taxes.

The secretary of the treasury authorized the statement that these certificates of indebtedness will be placed at the treasury department for deposits of public money of the United States in national banks whenever further deposits may be made and may at any time be substituted for United States bonds now held as security for deposits, on condition that the government bonds thus released be used as security for additional national bank notes.

Dirigible Balloon Successful.

Paris, April 2.—The Petit Parisien stated that the steerable balloon belonging to the brothers Pierre and Paul Lachaud was again successfully tried at Mosen. The airship ascended, executed a number of maneuvers and followed the course of the Seine for some distance. It then returned and was brought to the ground safely 100 yards from the starting point.

Irish Transportation Scheme.

London, April 2.—The details of the transportation scheme for Ireland which Lord Iveagh and Alderman Pirie have evolved, have not yet been divulged. It is generally expected that the plan proposed is for a network of light railways or of an extensive service of motor cars for the benefit of the agricultural districts. Lord Iveagh has already spent \$1,250,000 in transferring the Dublin steam into decent dwellings for the working class.
