Following a capital start, the nose of the Cambridge boat prompily showed in front and remained there throughout the race. Rowing with immense power the Cambridge men completely outclassed those of Oxford and increased their lead with every stroke, with the exception of a brief moment at the crabtree, when Monier-Williams, the Oxford stroke, spurted slightly and decreased the open-ing between the boats. PHILIPPINE CURRENCY ACT.

Col. Edwards Issue Circular Regarding Carrying it Out.

Washington, April 2 .-- Col. Edwards. chief of the bureau of insular affairs, has issued a circular announcing action looking to carrying out the Philippine currency act. It invites subscriptions for \$3,000,000 for the certificates of indebtedness of the government of the Philippines to be issued in coupon form in the denomination of \$1,000, dated May 1, 1903, bearing interest at the rate of 4 per cent, payable quarterly, and to be redeemable at New York in one year after date of issue in gold coin of the United States. These certificates are exempt from the payment of all

The secretary of the treasury authorizes the statement that these certificates of indebtedness will be accepted by the

treasury department for deposits of public money of the United States in deposits of national banks whenever further de posits may be made and may at any time be substituted for United States bonds now held as security for deposits. on condition that the government bonds thus released be used as security for additional national bank notes,

Dirigible Balloon Successful.

Paris, April 2.-The Petit Parisien stated that the steerable balloon belonging to the brothers Pierre and Paul Lebaudy was again success-fully tried at Mosen. The airship ascended, executed a number of manea-vers and followed the course of the Seine for some distance. It then returned and was brought to the ground easily 100 yards from the starting point.

Irish Transportation Scheme.

London, April 2 .- The details of the transportation scheme for Ireland which Lord Iveagh and Alderman Pirrie, have evolved, have not yet been di-vulged. It is generally expected that vulged. the plans provide for either a network of light railways or an extensive ser-

vice of motor cars for the benefit of the agricultural districts. Lord Iveagh has already spent \$1,250,000 in trans-forming the Dublin slums into decent dwellings for the working class.
