----CHINESE EDITOR TALKS.

Says America Makes a Mistake in Its Exclusion of His Countrymen.

Ning Poon Chew, managing editor of the "Chung Sai Yat PO," the Chinese

dally paper of San Francisco, was in town yesterday afternoon en route to Chicago. He says the American gov-ernment is badly mistaken in the rigidness of its exclusion of the Chinese and that the boycoti against American goods is being pushed strongly in the orient in conseduence. Mr. Chew is a member of the Chinese Presbyterian church in San Francisco which has distinguished itself by giving largely to foreign missions. He was been 23 years in this country. He believes the prospect for Claima is bright, and says: "I believe that in 12 years she will have a constitution, and in 20 years a standing army of \$00,000, where now she has a sitting army. China has vast resources. She can support 1.200,000, 000 people where now she has a popu-lation of 400,000,000. She has enough coal to supply to world for 2.000 years, She has silver and gold in abundance.

Shepard, pro-prietor of "Ye Old Booke Store" charged with mailing obscene matter; Geo, Boss, charged with selling liquor to In-dians; Robert L. Pringle, charged with using the mails to defraud, in a get rich quick concern; and Guston Smith, charged with importing women into United States for immoral pur poses.
