

## MANAGER CLAWSON BACK FROM FAIR.

Man Who Handled Utah's Display  
At Lewis and Clark Exposition  
Returns Home.

WILL SOON MAKE HIS REPORT.

Visits Idaho En Route and Speaks  
Highly of Its Prosperity and  
Growth.

Don Spencer Clawson, manager of Utah's display at the Lewis & Clark exposition, Portland, Ore., returned home this morning, after an absence of several months, having wound up the affairs connected with the Beehive state's exhibit. Mr. Clawson looks very well, and says he is enjoying the state of health. His service to the state terminated on the 13th inst. Referring to the big fair in the Rose city, he declares it was the most successful exhibition that has yet been held, both from artistic and financial standpoints. The stockholders will receive from 35 to 40 per cent on their investment. Altogether the showing is most remarkable. Mr. Clawson will make a final report to the Utah Fair commission at their next meeting, the date of which has not yet been fixed, as far as is known.

### IDAHO COAL INTERESTS.

On the way home Mr. Clawson spent a week in Idaho, and visited the Teton valley, where he has large agricultural, grazing and coal land interests, and while there he laid out and planned a new townsite to which was given the name of Clawson. It is a very desirable site, situated in the extreme north end of the Teton valley, seven miles from Driggs. In common with people of other sections of Idaho, he found those of the Teton most prosperous and happy. Just now they are very hopeful that the Short Line will extend a branch line from Sugar City eastward for a distance of 20 miles to the coal fields. Speaking of this coal, Mr. Clawson declares that just now it is in great demand. At one claim—the Bramwell—which he inspected on Saturday last, he learned that 300 tons had been taken out during the past 30 days, and farmers and other consumers of it, were entirely satisfied with regard to its heat-producing qualities. Other claims in the same section are also now being worked. As to the deposits themselves, Mr. Clawson declares that enough prospecting had been done to prove that they are well nigh inexhaustible. He thinks it is the future source of supply for Idaho, Montana and much of the surrounding country.

### STATE FORGING AHEAD.

Altogether, Mr. Clawson sees a most prosperous growth ahead for Idaho. Utah people, he says, scarcely realize how their northern neighbor is going ahead by leaps and bounds. Everything is bustle, and every body is busy. Fabulous stories of wheat and sugar beet yields are told. Trains are loaded going in and coming out. The population is increasing at a wonderful rate, the towns and cities are adding to their population, and there is an abundance of work, and good wages for all who will work.

### CHINESE EDITOR TALKS.

Says America Makes a Mistake in Its  
Exclusion of His Countrymen.

Ning Poon Chew, managing editor of the "Chung Sai Yat Po," the Chinese daily paper of San Francisco, was in town yesterday afternoon on route to Chicago. He says the American government is badly mistaken in the rigidity of its exclusion of the Chinese, and that the boycott against American goods is being pushed strongly in the orient in consequence. Mr. Chew is a member of the Chinese Presbyterian church in San Francisco which has distinguished itself by giving largely to foreign missions. He was born 23 years in this country. He believes the prospect for China is bright, and says: "I believe that in 12 years she will have a constitution, and in 20 years a standing army of 800,000, where now she has a militia army of 200,000. She has a population of 400,000,000. She has enough coal to supply the world for 2,000 years. She has silver and gold in abundance. Her iron supply is practically inexhaustible. And now China is beginning to awaken and ask herself why, with all these resources, she has stood still while Japan has advanced. They are beginning to wonder why China has been unable to resist Russian oppression while Japan successfully undertook to do it."

"Already rapid progress has been made toward an enlightened system of government and education. There are 150 students in the United States, sent here by the Chinese government. There are 8,000 in Japan, and something like 300 in Europe. There are great things ahead for China and the Chinese. China's resources are unbounded, while every Chinese youth, no matter how humble his station, may rise to any public office save that of emperor. With the latter exception, all government positions are open by examination."

## SUES MEMBERS OF GRAND JURY.

Attorney Udall Demands \$50,000  
For Alleged Defamation  
Of Character.

NOT GUILTY OF MISCONDUCT.

Says Jury Was Falsely Pretending to  
Be Legally Organized Body When  
It Made Report.

Because the grand jury made an alleged false, impertinent and defamatory report in regard to him, George A. Udall, an attorney residing at Eureka, today filed suit in the district court against the members of the jury to recover damages in the sum of \$50,000. The complaint alleges that prior to Nov. 4, 1915, the plaintiff was an attorney at law practicing in the courts of this state, and had never been guilty of any misconduct or malpractice in connection with his profession, but that, notwithstanding said fact, the defendants named herein, James Hutchinson, L. O. Schofield, Thomas Crooks, James T. Belliston, Alfred Gaid, A. F. Heckler, John Harris and James A. Melville, Jr., returned and published on the above date the following report of and concerning plaintiff:

"We further find and report that one George Udall, an attorney at law of Eureka, Juab county, has been guilty of unprofessional conduct, and recommending that the State bar association make further investigation."

It is alleged that said false and defamatory words were written and published by the defendants while they were falsely pretending to be acting as a lawfully authorized grand jury. Udall claims that said statement has greatly injured him in his profession and deprived him of Salt Lake last evening and which would otherwise have arisen and accrued to him in his profession, all to his damage in the sum named above.

### NEWTON LECTURE TOMORROW.

Prof. C. B. Newton the humorous entertainer who appeared before the students of the Latter-day Saints' University, as well as at a number of other places in this state two years ago, arrived in Salt Lake last evening and is stopping at the Kenyon. He will appear at the L. D. S. University Wednesday morning, on which occasion the students will doubtless enjoy a rare treat.

Corner on Third South and West Temple Sells for \$50,000.

### EMBEZZLEMENT CHARGED.

Case Against W. C. Jensen Now on  
In Judge Diehl's Court.

The preliminary hearing of W. C. Jensen, bookkeeper for McCoy's Livestock stable, charged with the embezzlement of \$600, is on in Judge C. B. Diehl's court today. The case will probably occupy at least two days. A. R. Kendall is the complaining witness. Assistant County Attorney Lyon is conducting the prosecution and Attorney A. Snow is representing the defense.

### STOLE TROLLEY WIRE.

Blacksmith in Jail Charged With the  
Crime of Grand Larceny.

William Brown, a blacksmith, was arrested this morning by Sergeant Roberts and Officer Clough, on the charge of stealing a large quantity of trolley wire from the Utah Light & Railway company. Where the man got the wire, or when he was stolen, has not been found out as yet by the officers. The man is charged with grand larceny and is in jail.

### ELEVEN INDICTMENTS.

Federal Grand Jury Concludes Its  
Work and Makes Report.

No new arrests were made today by the United States marshal's office as a result of the session of the grand jury, which was concluded last night, although six indictments were returned, in which the names have not been given out. The men wanted, it is thought, are not residents of Salt Lake, and the arrests will consequently be made more slowly.

The report of the grand jury shows that it considered 13 cases, and returned true bills against 11 of them. The five men who are now under arrest or under bonds are as follows: E. A. Shepard, charged with sending out unreliable matter; R. B. Shepard, charged with mailing obscene matter; Geo. Boss, charged with selling liquor to Indians; Robert L. Pringle, charged with using the mails to defraud, in a get rich quick concern; and Guston Smith, charged with importing women into the United States for immoral purposes.

## ANOTHER DEAD MAN IS FOUND.

Gruesome Discovery Made at a  
Point Nine Miles From Salt  
Lake This Morning.

NAME OF VICTIM NOT KNOWN.

Is Apparently About 50 Years of Age  
And Was But Partially Clad—  
Police Investigating.

The silent mountains today gave up another dead man who apparently ceased to exist a month or more ago. At a point nine miles from Salt Lake and three miles from the City creek road the body now lies awaiting the arrival of the officers.

The matter was reported at police headquarters at 2 o'clock this afternoon by F. W. Dover and Robert McClure who had been on a hunting trip in the mountains. As they decided not to examine the body until the authorities had viewed the remains they can throw but little light on the mystery. According to the story told by the gentlemen they were walking along the mountain side northeast of City creek about nine miles distant from this city when they came upon the partly decomposed remains of a man lying out in the open. The man was apparently about 50 years of age and had a sandy beard and mustache. The hair, which was of the same color, was missing from the skull save where he head rests upon the ground.

A peculiar feature about the affair is that with the exception of a vest, white shirt, undershirt and black tie the body is nude. The two men noticed some papers sticking out of the vest pocket but did not disturb them. They looked around on the mountain side for the missing clothing but failed to find any, however it may be close at hand as the ground at this point is partially covered with snow. From a casual examination of the remains no wound was apparent and the cause of death is a mystery.

As soon as the news was received at police headquarters an effort was made by the officers to locate Acting Coroner Danta T. Smith. As soon as he is found the party will leave for the scene to bring in the remains. It is not anticipated that they will return to Salt Lake until late in the evening.

### UTAH NOT BACKWARD.

President Kingsbury Says State School  
Ranks Well With Other Schools.

President J. T. Kingsbury of the University of Utah returned home last night from an extended trip through the east, during which he visited many state universities and attended a convention of the National Association of State Universities and State Mining schools at Washington, D. C. President Kingsbury is much impressed with the good work being done in educational lines by the places at which he stopped, and comes back with a number of new ideas secured by visiting universities of the east.

In regard to the University of Utah, President Kingsbury states that its equipment and course rank well alongside of those seen elsewhere, except that the arts department was not sufficiently provided with books and equipment. A graduate department of the University of Utah, President Kingsbury stated, would be the next to be initiated.

## PRESIDENT SMITH FLATLY REFUSED.

Attempt to Get Him to Sanction  
Polygamous Marriage Fails  
Utterly.

PARTIES TRIED IT IN MEXICO.

Arrest of E. H. Conger and Pearl Gurr  
At El Paso, Brings Out True  
Status of Case.

El Paso, Tex., Nov. 21.—The arrest here of E. H. Conger and Pearl Gurr, of Utah, brings out the fact that President Smith of the "Mormon" Church, absolutely refuses to sanction plural marriages any more. Conger declares that he fell in love with Miss Gurr in Utah, and, although married, his wife agreed that he could also marry Miss Gurr. Being refused a license in Utah he went to the "Mormon" colonies in Mexico, expecting to marry there, and for the first wife, and make a home there for both. He says President Smith was visiting the colonies and flatly refused to permit the marriage, and the couple started back home, and arriving here, were arrested, Conger being charged with abduction of the girl. Conger says both have been expelled from the Church by President Smith.
