FIRST TRIAL RACE

Dark Horse May Possibly Defend

Roosevelt Cup Against

Germans.

WINDRIM KID IS SECOND.

Of Seventeen Entries Two Boats Have

Easy Sailing for the Finish and

Fight It Out Moments.

Marblehead, Mass., Aug. 12.—The Spokane, a dark horse, owned by Vice Com-

modore P. Lewis Clark of the Eastern

Yacht club, won the first of the trial

days of the defense of the Roosevelt

Cup, which was won by H. L. Howden,

finished second and Windrim Kid,

Nid. P. G. Macomber, owner, was third.

Practically throughout the race it was

a battle between the Spokane and the

Windrim Kid, the Haystack passing the

latter in the last three miles of the

race.

There were seventeen starters in the

race, which was the first three series of

five races to decide the German-American

championship of the Eastern Yacht club

in sailing. The Spokane was owned by

the Roosevelt cup against the three

German challengers. The contest was

called over a triangular course of

fifty miles, the course of the day and

seventeen starters finished crossed the

finish line, the Spokane dropping out on

the day, when she carried away her

prize.

IDEAL YACHTING.

The day was ideal in every way for

yachting, and the wind was just suited

to the "Coco" type of boat. It was a

the finish, and a run to the finish.

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FISHER CUP.

It Goes to the Canadian Challenger

Zoraya After Speedy Race.

Rochester, N. Y., Aug. 12.—The yacht

race for the Fisher cup was concluded

here this afternoon when the Zoraya,

the Canadian challenger, took

possession of the trophy, representing the

Rochester Yacht club, holder of the trophy.

The Zoraya represented the Royal

Canadian Yacht club of Toronto. The

race today was over a windward and

leeward course of eighteen miles. The

official time of the start was 12:00.

The Zoraya was the first to get

the letter of the start, but the Zoraya

passed her in a short time and was

headed thereafter. The American boat

was outdistanced by the Canadian
