LOCAL BRIEFS.

Edwin H. Lovey, a laborer, has filed a petition in bankruptcy, with liabilities at \$382.30, and assets at \$83.55.

C. E. Le Roy, convicted of the larceny of blankets, was sentenced to 60 days in the county jail by Judge C. B. Diehl this morning.

The Liberty Stake fair has been postponed one week on account of the death of Jesse B. Higgs, and will open on the evening of the 27th inst.

S. M. Covey of this city has sold to O. T. Samson of Soda Springs \$210.00 of ground and five eight room, brick dwellings on Third East, between Third and Fourth South streets for \$210.00.

Rabbi C. J. Freund of the Jewish Temple will give a series of Monday evening lectures in a dinner Saturday evening, at the Y. M. C. A., as a token of esteem and regard. Charles H. Post takes the position vacated by Mr. Cassidy.

Nearly 300,000 acres of available land has been discovered in Nevada subject to entry, and the best to the San Pedro road. Moreover, about 100,000 acres of desert land near Las Vegas has been secured by speculators who are offering the same from \$5 to \$10 per acre.

Supt. W. P. S. Hawk of the Postal Telegraph company is back from a Montana trip, and says that his company has just strung two additional wires between Butte and Portland, and believes it will be necessary to string two more wires between this city and Los Angeles.

The pupils of the eighth grade at the Lincoln school made another perfect record in attendance and punctuality during the past month. So far this year not a pupil in that class has been absent or tardy. The eight grade class at the Grand school has been perfect in punctuality during the entire year.

All taxes not paid to County Treasurer (Carvin) by Wednesday evening will be declared delinquent and the property advertised for sale. The tax collections so far have been up to the average and it is expected that between now and Wednesday evening there will be the usual rush. In order to save the advertising costs the taxes must be paid by closing time on Wednesday.

DILWORTH OBSEQUIES. Another Utah Pioneer Laid to Rest in the Silent Tomb.

The funeral services over the remains of the late John Taylor Dilworth were conducted Sunday morning, Nov. 12, from the residence of his sister, Mrs. George Nebeker, Elder William W. Riter officiating.

Those who spoke on the occasion were the companions of the deceased who were associated with him in the earliest days of his pioneer work. They were Elders A. Milton Musser, Angus M. Cannon, Hiram B. Clawson and Joseph E. Taylor, all of whom referred to his kindly disposition, his sterling integrity to what he deemed to be his duty to God and to his fellowmen. The opening and closing prayers were made by Bishops Alfred Solomon and John N. Riter respectively.

The deceased had been a great sufferer during the latter years of his life, having been rendered partially helpless from a stroke of paralysis, which occurred about seven years ago.

The burial rites were profuse and very beautiful.

A quartet composed of Messrs. Whitney, Pyper, Spencer and Ensign rendered feelingly the selection entitled, "We Need Thee O Lord, O Lord Divine" and "Refuge of the Weary," which added materially to the impressiveness of the occasion.

The pallbearers were composed of six of the eldest sons of the deceased's sister, namely: William W. Riter, Chas. Harper, C. D. Brinton, Amos H. Neff, George D. Nebeker and Walter D. Nebeker.

The remains were followed to the cemetery by a large cortege of carriages filled with sorrowing relatives and friends. After the dedicatory prayer, which was offered by Elder John L. Nebeker, the casket bearing the remains was deposited in the grave mound in the beautiful lot of his daughter, Mrs. Marion Beattie Edwards, which is very pleasantly situated in the city cemetery, where lies, not far away, the body of his wife, Mrs. Josephine Mendenhall Dilworth, who preceded him some 23 years and who was the mother of his three children, Mrs. Marie Beattie Edwards, Mrs. Frank Russell and John Dilworth, the latter having also preceded him about 25 years.

HIS DEATH A MYSTERY.

Decomposed Remains of Private Dynes Found at Fort Douglas.

A ghastly discovery was made back of the target range at Fort Douglas Saturday afternoon, by Sgt. Betts of H. Company, Twenty-ninth Infantry. When he discovered the skeleton of Private William Dynes of the same company, who disappeared last July, and had been reported as a deserter. The finding in which the skeleton was clad identified the remains. The deceased was 25 years of age, and had been very dissipated. At the time of his disappearance Dynes took his rifle with him, but this was missing when he was found, and if he had taken any other article of value it was carried off by some one. He had just re-enlisted in July, and whether the death was due to suicide or accident can hardly be ascertained. Dynes was formerly in the Old Soldiers home at Washington, having served in the civil war, but the old white haired veteran made so much fun of him that he had and he entered the service. The remains will be buried today.
