Leaver, who is in charge of the well known Butters' laboratory in this city. Mr. Butters, who came in from 1 3-16 the west on Sunday, has spent the interim investigating the work at the laboratory, the most interesting feature of which is the experiments in concentration of ores by the Elmore oil

> In a conversation with a "News" reporter today, Mr. Butters expressed the greatest confidence in the future of the oil process. At Cripple Creek the tests n tellurium ores have been very satisfactory.
