

## FISHER LOOKED FOR AN ACCIDENT

President of Indianapolis Motor Speedway Company Suggested Before Coroner.

TRACK WAS NOT COMPLETED.

Races Were Put on in Spite of This Fact—Had a Hospital Built.

Indianapolis, Aug. 26.—Coroner Blackwell yesterday made public the testimony of Carl G. Fisher, president of the Motor Speedway company in the case of William Bourque and Harry Holcomb, killed at the speedway in races of Aug. 19.

When asked concerning the condition of the track Fisher said it was in good condition when the races started. He admitted that there was a bad place in the track where the track crossed a ditch, but he was sure that it had no part in the wreck, as the car was going 70 miles an hour when the axle plates broke. The coroner then asked Fisher if they did not put on the races before the track was finished. To this Fisher answered in the affirmative.

"It is a fact that you did not have time to complete the track," asked the coroner.

"That is true," Fisher answered.

"You were expecting an accident of some kind were you not?" the coroner continued.

"Yes, sir," was the reply.

"And for that reason you had the hospital built there?"

"Yes, sir,"

Coroner Blackwell asked Fisher how much longer it would have taken to make the track perfect and he answered that it would never be in perfect shape, as a gang of men was constantly kept busy making repairs when the racers were not on the track.

LARGEST RESIDENCE ON LONG ISLAND BURNED

New York, Aug. 26.—Eleven hours after Dr. Oliver Livingstone Jones, who owns property in nearly every state of the Union, was returned to his home at Cold Spring Harbor, L. I., the house caught fire and was burned to the ground. The house, said to have been the largest private residence on Long Island, was built 60 years ago and contained more than 100 rooms.

The weak physical condition of a son had caused Dr. Jones to worry excessively and he disappeared Tuesday night. Yesterday he was found in the woods by an automobile party.

With the house were destroyed many works of art and a fortune in tapestries and furniture.

RUSSIAN POLICE METHODS.

Bartlett, Socialist, Says Emperor Nicholas is Cognizant of Them.

Berlin, Aug. 25.—Der Voerwaerts, the leading Socialist organ, prints an article by the Russian Socialist, Bartlett, who, unmasked the Russian spy Aker, which is designed to correct an impression prevailing outside of Russia that the Russian emperor is not acquainted with the objectionable methods and acts of the Russian secret police. Bartlett gives a fac-simile page of the so-called "Journal of the Czar" consisting of brief summaries of information prepared by the police department solely for the emperor's use. Bartlett declares that through a secret channel he was enabled thoroughly to examine three volumes of the journal which show, he says, that Emperor Nicholas is fully informed of everything going on in the police administration.

TILLMAN ON TAFT.

Anderson, S. C., Aug. 25.—"President Taft," said Senator Tillman in an address here today, "is the tool of a great political machine, and his appointment of census enumerators is in furtherance of his efforts to break the 'solid south.'"

Mr. Tillman spoke before a reunion of the Red Shirt men who in 1870 wrested the political machinery of the state from negroes and carpetbaggers.

NOTED FLATHEAD CHIEF FOUND DYING

Missoula, Aug. 25.—Chief Sam Resurrection, one of the noted sub-chiefs of the Flathead Indian tribe, was found in a dying condition beside the Northern Pacific railroad near Bozeman. Circumstances surrounding the case cause the officers to entertain suspicion of foul play.

Insurrection was discovered by a section crew. His skull had been fractured as though from a blow with a heavy instrument, and his left wrist was broken. He was unconscious. After being taken to the hospital at Missoula and an operation performed, but his life is despaired of. Chief Resurrection was an important witness against a Missoula saloon man indicted for subornation of perjury in connection with the sale of liquor to Indians and was to have appeared before the federal court at Helena on September 2, to testify in the case. The officers are investigating.

OREGON LAND CASES.

Many of the Remaining Indictments Will be Dismissed This Fall.

Portland, Ore., Aug. 25.—Many of the remaining indictments in the old Oregon land fraud cases which were brought by Francis J. Heney probably will be dismissed this fall, and it

is likely, it is stated, that the indictments against Binger Hermann, former commissioner of the general land office at Washington, may be among these.

Mr. Heney, who arrived in Portland last night, has announced that he will not prosecute Hermann and that he does not know whether Hermann will ever be tried. He added that this matter now rests with Atty. Gen. Wickesham.

United States Dist. Atty. McCourt has been examining papers in the various cases and declares that he intends to clear the docket this autumn. Some of the cases, McCourt says, are triable. Regarding others he has not arrived at a decision. He classes the Hermann case among the triable cases, but he states also that the matter is in the hands of the attorney general.
