

WEATHER AND CROPS

A Changed Condition has Come and the Farmers are Happy.

GRAIN AND GRASS GROWING FAST.

Wheat Damaged on the Lowlands of Millard County by snow and floods.

Regarding weather and crops of the last week Observer's summary says:

General Review.

Changed conditions have at last come, and the weather for the closing days of the past week was such as to greatly encourage farmers, as their crops are now growing fast. The farmers are not grumbling, and are satisfied with the crop prospects are reasonably favorable.

The forecast of last week was cold, with cloudy and rainy days, but the last three days were so warm and sunny as to give a wonderful impetus to all vegetation.

Fruit trees of all kinds and another are in bloom or opening foliage everywhere. In the later districts apples and peaches are not yet in bloom, but will be. Strawberries are in blossom in many localities. If no untoward damage occurs, it is quite certain that the fruit crop will be large.

Grain and grass are much improved since the preceding report. Wheat that was up during the cold week, although it did not grow in height, stood out well. Grain sprouting during the cold spell came up rather thin. In Millard county it was damaged by the heavy snow that was mentioned last week, and the succeeding flood; it looks quite yellow on the lowlands.

Wheat planting has begun. Potatoes and corn will be late crops this year; they will be successful or not. Even in the most backward localities, plowing and planting of spring crops is progressing fast, the farmers took advantage of the warm weather to rush things.

Extensive From Correspondents' Reports.

BOX ELDER COUNTY.

Beat River City (1)—It seems spring is coming with its usual amount of rain, and all grain is making a marked improvement. Plowing is somewhat slow in this locality, and has not yet begun to hurry.

(2) The last week has been the best one this spring for the advancement of crops of all kinds. The rains were quite heavy, but the week was very cold to what it has been.

Box Elder City—Weather still chilly, with one blizzard and several showers. The grain is doing well generally. Apples are in full bloom, and cherries and peaches have begun blooming.

CACHE COUNTY.

Benoni—Quite a frost on the 4th. No damage. A generally cloudy day with cold winds. Looking like a clearing up now. Plowing is well advanced.

Newtown—The first three days were very stormy, and farmers were delayed in putting in spring grain; the remainder of the week has been fine, and of great benefit to grain and meadow, which has begun to put in an appearance.

Millville—The early part of the week was very stormy and cold; the latter part was much better, and considerable plowing was done. Grass is beginning to grow in good shape; also the earliest planted grain.

RICH COUNTY.

Randolph—Frost on the 5th slightly injured late corn when it was in the way. May 10th, the first spring day this season. Every available team is in the field today. Very little grain is in, as yet, but it will not take long to finish dropping if the weather permits.

WERNER COUNTY.

Harrieville—Heavy rains on the 3rd and 5th. The week has been unusually stormy, preventing farmers from doing much. It has been good for plowing out grain, which has very promising prospects. Corn planting is under way.

Hunterville—About 0.75 inch of rain during the week. This week has been very cold and stormy; consequently there is but little plowing done yet. Spring is one month later than usual. Nothing is far enough along to have been injured by the frost of the 4th.

Hopewell—Heavy rain on the 5th, and the morning of the 6th, quite a frost after it, but no apparent damage to the fruit. Very cold heavy all the week. Peaches are about to come into bloom. Grain crops on the dry benches look well, but are making little growth.

MORGAN COUNTY.

Potomac—This week has been so cold and wet that very little plowing has been done. On the 2nd heavy rain and thunderstorm; 5th, snow and rain; 7th and 8th very warm. A great amount of alfalfa seems to be killed; a few warm days will revive it, if it can.

DAVIS COUNTY.

Layton—Heavy rain on the 5th, forcing has now made its appearance. Wanda Creek—Frost on the 3d.

Rain and hail on the 4th. No damage to the crops in this section of the country.

SALT LAKE COUNTY.

Mill Creek—Cold weather hindered the growth of seeds planted. There has been nearly two inches of rain during the week. Potatoes are late but doing well. Infestation of a light grain, potato and fruit harvest. Grain is coming up very thick. Potatoes are not promising.

Heavy—Fore part of week cold with slight frost. Turned warmer the last three days, which with the rain should cause rapid growth. Wheat is just sprouting out of the ground. Fruit trees are in bloom.

WARREN COUNTY.

Hester—Cold and stormy, except the last two days. Very little plowing done up to the 10th today (10th) but out in every direction.

UTAH COUNTY.

Lehi—Small grain and grass has grown, but other crops are not much advanced. Sugar beets are coming up well. Potatoes are in bloom.

Promont—(1)—Last two days quite warm and sunny. Potatoes and sugar beets are in bloom. Other crops are coming up well.

(2)—Although the week was cold and stormy, and crops made no headway, the farmers are not grumbling. The farmers are about five inches high. Potato planting is on the coast now, with the last in fine condition.

Springville—The weather has been unusually cold until the 7th, since then fine and warm. Should produce excellent crops in a few days, plowing will be done on the lowlands. Potatoes are now in bloom.

UTAH COUNTY.

Levan (1)—Latter part of week warm and sunny, but the weather was so cold that it did not grow in height, stood out well. Grain sprouting during the cold spell came up rather thin.
