**DESPERATE BATTLE
WITH MASKED HOLDUPS**

Wilson Brothers Capture Outlaw and Turn Him Over to Police—
Pal Escapes.

OGDEN, Nov. 15.—On Saturday evening shortly before 8 o'clock, two masked men with drawn pistols walked into the Wilson Brothers grocery store, at 120 Twenty-eighth street and ordered Tom Wilson, one of the proprietors, to open the safe. The clerk, Stanley and Clarence Tite, the clerk, to hold up their hands. They were about to comply with the demand when one of the would-be robbers caught a glimpse of George Wilson, who is a city councilman, seated at his desk in the rear of the building. Turning his eyes about to order him also to hold up his hands when Tom Wilson hurled a heavy lead weight at the hold-up man, striking him a terrific blow in the face. He quickly recovered and fired his gun at Tom Wilson, the ball passing within a few inches of Wilson's head, burying itself in the wall. Mountain George Wilson rushed up from behind and knocked the robber to the floor. The other man, who had remained near the front door, rushed out and escaped in the darkness. A struggle for the possession of the revolver took place between the two men. Wilson got hold of it and raised a shower of blows on the head of the robber. **TRAGIC DEATH OF
FRED M. BRAMWELL**

Boy of 15 Meets Instant Death by Contact With Electric Wires.

OGDEN, Nov. 15.—By coming into contact with live wires on the transmission line of the Telephone Power company, Fred M. Bramwell, the 15-year-old son of J. S. Bramwell, met instant death Saturday afternoon about 4:30 o'clock. Young Bramwell, who lives at 228 Harrison road, and a boy companion, while walking in the foothills just east of the state industrial school, came to one of the Telephone company's new steel towers, recently constructed to carry its very heavy electric current from the plant to Logan in Salt Lake City. Bramwell and his companion climbed each other to climb the tower and in some way the former became entangled with the wires at the top and was instantly burned to death, receiving about 5,000 volts into his body. The other boy ran to the industrial school and notified a Mr. Zeeveloff, who accompanied him back to the scene of the accident. Mr. Zeeveloff climbed the tower and freed the body of young Bramwell, which was terribly burned. The body was taken to Larikin & Son's undertaking establishment and preparations for the funeral are being made.
