## DESPERATE BATTLE WITH MASKED HOLDUPS

Wilson Brothers Capture Outlaw and Turn Him Over to Police—Pal Escapes.

OGDEN, Nov. 15.—On Saturday evening shortly before 8 o'clock two masked men with drawn pistols walked into the Wilson Brothers grocery store, at 20 Twenty-eighth street and ordered Tom Wilson, one of the proprietors, and Clarence Tice, the clerk, to hold up their hands. They were about to comply with the demand when one of the would-be robbers caught a glimpse of George Wilson, who is a city councilman, seated at his desk in the rear of the building. Turning his gun on George Wilson, the highwayman was about to order him also to hold up his hands when Tom Wilson hurled a heavy weight at the hold-up, striking him a terrible blow in the face. He quickly recovered and fired his gun at Tom Wilson, the ball passing within a few inches of Wilson's head, burying itself in the wall. Meantime George Wilson rushed up from behind and knocked the robber to the floor. The other man, who had remained near the front door, rushed out and escaped in the darkness. A struggle for the possession of the revolver took place and finally George Wilson got hold of it and raised a shower of blows on the highwayman's head. The latter was completely overpowered by the three men and the police came to the scene with Captain Howard, Detective Pender, and Deputy Sheriff Murphy. At the police station the prisoner gave the name of Elbert Watson and stated that he had been in Butte and that he came to Utah several weeks ago from New Mexico. He was searched and a return ticket on the Salt Lake & Ogden railroad was issued Nov. 16. Local officers are inclined to think that Watson is not his pal, of whom they have a good record. The men who have been committing so many robberies in Salt Lake City and a description of them has been furnished to the Salt Lake officers.

**SENT TO REFORMATORY.**  
OGDEN, Nov. 15.—Fred Braemer and Ellen Stewart, the two boys who were recently arrested by juvenile court officers, and who had a number of pistol, skeleton keys, and other questionable articles in their possession, were committed to the Juvenile School Saturday afternoon and it is hoped that the men who have been committing so many robberies in Salt Lake City and a description of them has been furnished to the Salt Lake officers.

**SEES GETS \$2,000 DAMAGES.**  
OGDEN, Nov. 15.—James Gee was awarded \$2,000 for damages while working in one of the mine shafts for the Utah Construction Company in Nevada. The accident happened Dec. 16. The judgment was rendered by a panel of the attorney for both parties.

**STATE ART INSTITUTE OPENS.**

OGDEN, Nov. 15.—The eleventh annual exhibition of the Utah State Art Institute opened Saturday evening at the Ogden High school building under very favorable circumstances. Many noted artists and other prominent people were present and every seat in the large auditorium was filled. About 300 pictures are on exhibition in the main room. An address of welcome was delivered by Superintendent of Schools, Dr. M. Mills, and some splendid music was given by Prof. Spurz Coop and Charles Kent Donald, band director, art supervisor in the schools, acted as master of ceremonies during the evening. It is mostly due to his activities that the institute has brought to Ogden, thus giving the people here an opportunity of seeing the work being done by Utah artists.

The public are invited to attend the institute every day from 9 o'clock in the morning until the same hour in the evening. There will be some one in attendance constantly to show visitors the work of art and to explain the merits of the exhibits. The institute will be open for two weeks and during that time lectures on art and art work will be given by those highest in the profession. The lectures, as well as the exhibit are free, and the public are not only invited but urged to attend.

## BACK FROM LONG MISSION.

PROVO, Nov. 15.—Elder Wilford Booth returned from a seven-years' mission to Turkey. Wednesday accompanied by Mrs. Booth, his second mission Elder Booth has filled in Turkey the first being of four years' duration. During his last mission he presided over the Turkish mission.

Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock Elder Wilford Booth on coming home from Turkey telephoned from Helvetia to his brother, Judge Pritchett, in the city that he was coming and asked the judge to meet him at the depot. The urgent reason for this was that Elder Booth has an Armenian family by the name of Ordillen with him. They have been sick and Elder Booth wanted to leave them and some one who would help them to find new friends while walking in the foothills just east of the state industrial school, came to one of the Teluride company's new steel towers, recently constructed to carry its telephone electric current from the plant to Larkin in the Lake. The Bramwell and his companion dashed each other to climb the tower and in some way the former became entangled with the wires at the top and was instantly burned to death, receiving about \$4,000 volts into his body. The other boy ran to the industrial school and telephoned to the company to accompany him back to the scene of the accident. Mr. Zweigert climbed the tower and freed the body of young Bramwell, which was terribly burned. The body was taken to Larkin & Son's undertaking establishment and preparations for the funeral are being made.

## FUNERAL OF E. A. BRISCOE.

PROVO, Nov. 15.—Judge Noon accompanied by his daughter, Mrs. E. A. Briscoe, arrived Saturday from Teluride, Colo., bringing with them the remains of E. A. Briscoe, who died last week.
