Escape f revented. JERSEY CITY, 6.—Three inmates of the Hudson County Jall, named Murphy, Rogers and James Ander-son, made a dangerous attempt to escape. When an iron door was opened to give the prisoners their breakfast they rushed past the watchman, who succeeded in stop-ping a fourth prisoner. The three prisoners ran into the kitchen, where some female prisoners and an old man, named Tucker, at-tempted to prevent their escape. Anderson seized a large knife and cut Tucker in the arm. Then they ran into the court yard and escaped over an eight feet wall. The assist-ant jailor hearing a noise seized a revolver and ran to meet the priso-ners coming over the wall. He opened fire and, with the aid of some citizens, succeeded in captur-ing all of them. Anderson was shot in the back of the head and severely wounded.
