JUAB STAKE CONFERENCE.

The Quarterly Conference of the Juab Stake of Zion was held on Saturday and Sunday the 23d and 24th October. On Saturday morning the bishops of the several wards gave in their reports, from which this Stake appears to be in a prosperous condition. The superintendents of Sunday Schools also gave in their reports, which show that although the average attendance of scholars is not as good as during the winter and spring seasons, it is fully as good as at the same period of the year at any previous time. President Teasdale reported that the Saints are paying a liberal tithing this season. Apostle Wilford Woodruff addressed the Conference on Sunday afternoon, exhorting the Saints to pay their tithing and temple donations, and to live as near the Lord as possible that they may be entitled to his blessings. On Sunday Apostle Woodruff, Prest. Teasdale and Elder L. E. Harrington addressed the Conference, each giving much good instruction. On Sunday afternoon the authorities of the church were presented by Prest. Teasdale and were sustained by the unanimous vote of the conference, as presented and sustained at the general conference in Salt Lake City. The authorities of this Stake were also presented and unanimously sustained as voted at our last conference with the following exceptions, viz: Elder John Keinke was sustained as a member of the High Council of this Stake in place of Jacob J. Bigler, Jr., who is going on a mission. Elder Samuel Ringrose was sustained as First Counselor to Bishop Charles Sperry in place of Bro. Wm. F. Tolley, who has charge of the board of trade of this Stake, now in Colorado. Elder Geo. W. McConkie was sus-

tained as Second Counselor to Bishop John M. Haws, of Mona, in place of J. W. Bell, who has removed from the county. His commission has been received, the Governor probably taking your view in which your correspondent concurred, that the former office could be no bar to the latter. Whilst I still hold that he need not necessarily have been commissioned under the re-election Act, it can of course work no hardship to the receiver, but will show another "Liberal" defeat. Mr. Fotheringham has been quite easy over the matter.
