Yesterday afternoon, Judge E. A. Smith and Clerk H. G. McMillan selected 300 names from which are to be chosen jurors for service in the Third District Court during this year. The names and list are as follows:

United States of America, Territory of Utah, County of Salt Lake, In pursuance of section 4 of an act of Congress, in relation to courts and judicial officers of the Territory of Utah, approved June 23, 1874, and title III, chapter of Laws of Utah, Hon. E. A. Smith, Probate Judge of Salt Lake County, Utah Territory, and H. G. McMillan, Clerk of the District Court for the Third Judicial District of Utah Territory, met at the office of said Probate Judge at Salt Lake City and County, Utah Territory, on the 27th day of January, A. Mrs. Marks, of Eureka, is in fresh trouble, her latest worry, like the others, arising out of financial transactions. When complaint was made against Constable Sullivan and others for the proceedings of December 19th, the deputies went out to Eureka and subpoenaed a number of witnesses. These declined to come on the ground that they had no means to pay their fare to Salt Lake. Mr. Marks was in Eureka, and would let no small matter like that stand in the way of the prosecution, so he handed Deputy Frank \$18.50 of Mrs. Marks' money to meet the bill. The railway fare came to \$1 more than that, and the deputy raised the difference himself. After the conclusion of the examination before Commissioner Norrell, Mrs. Marks asked to have her money refunded. She was considerably taken by surprise, however, when she was told that that could not be. There was no provision of law that required the Territory to pay the fees of witnesses where the preliminary examination was held before a United States Commissioner, and as the witnesses obtained no fees or mileage, they could not pay Mrs. Marks for their railway fare. Her husband had advanced the money, and must be content to lose it.

The Marinelli Combination.

This company appear in the Theatre on Friday and Saturday next. Speaking of the central figure in the group, Marinelli, an exchange has the following:

QUICK FROM LATEST EXCHANGES.

At Port Townsend, W. T., Dec. 28, the citizens subscribed \$5,000 to build marine ways suitable for the accommodation of vessels of 1500 tons. The site selected is on Port Townsend bay, one-half mile above the town. The improvements will be commenced about April next. The enterprise will be the means of retaining many thousands of dollars each month and will be a great convenience to shipping interests. The necessary machinery has been ordered.

The blockade still continues on the Northern Pacific switchback over the summit of the Cascades. Every available man has been pressed into service, and Superintendent Cole has 100 at work trying to force a passage through the snow.

A dispatch dated Nogales (A. T.), Dec. 29, says: Grasshoppers are devouring the gardens and all vegetation in the southern portion of Sonora, Mexico. They were never known to appear in such large numbers before. In many portions of the State they have completely ruined the gardens, fields and meadows, and have also done great damage to fruit trees.
