there has been a steady decline since except in Russia. Another fact recorded is that the birth rate is highest in the poorest districts. The truth appears to be that America and Europe are having much the same experience. Almost everywhere the well-to-do have small families and the poor have large families. The country whose birth rate has not declined is remarkable for the poverty of its people and for its deplorable social onditions.

Mr. Barclay refers to a law on the subject which he says was first pro-mulgated by Doubleday in 1841 and rejected by Mill. It runs as follows: "With improved conditions of life fer-tility of plants and animals (includ-ing man) declines and it increases countries culminated in 1876, and that | ing man) declines, and it increases i nations.

when they are exposed to such un-favorable conditions as would threat-en the extinction of the species." From this law the conclusions are reached that human volition has little to do with the birth rate and that the birth rate is inversely proportional to the weil-being of its people.

"Nature." he says, "without injustice or impar-tiality, gives in turn to individuals of every class a fair opportunity of se-curing her fvors." But whatever theories my be advanced as to the operation of a law, the similarity of conditions is the interesting thing to observe. Fear may vanish at the thought that if the United States is committing suicide, so are the other nations.
