the general waiting room. THE CONCOURSE.

At the rear, or track side, of the building, is a one-story concourse, 5 feet wide by 390 feet long, with stee roof trusses spanning its entre width This concourse is open on the track side above six feet, but is arranged to close with sash during the winter senson. An open train shed, 40 feet season. An open train shed, 40 teet wide, architecturally designed and con-structed with open lattice work, spans the track transversely, of a height to allow free passage of trains. This shed is for the protection of passen-gers, going and coming from trains in inclement weather. Further protec-tion will be rendered patrons in the erection of unphrelia sheds between each series of tracks for a distance of erection of unpercha shear between each series of tracks for a distance of 400 feet, for the protection of passen-gers getting off or on any part of the train. These sheds will be 16 feet wide by 10 feet in height. A heating plant for the station building will be located in the basement.

FRENCH RENNAISSANCE,

In selecting a motif of treatment, the French Rennaissance was adopted, great care being exercised to carry out the detail in true proportions. Color effect of materials for both outside and inside work entered largely into the architect's calculations, so as to pro-duce a harmonious and logical compo-sition. The base, or plinth above the ground line will be faced with finely teoled granite. The walls above will be of brick of a warm tone of buff, with the panels between windows of the central portion of the street eleva-tion of Sienna marble. All helt cours-es, water table and the entire cornice entablature will be of torra cotta of a color to match the brick work. The entrance doors will be of bronze, fin-ished a dork copper color, and the marquee over the front and side ex-its as well as the ornamental roof cresting, will be of cast hon, plaied to match the color of the doors. BRIDGE OVER TRACKS.

BRIDGE OVER TRACKS. At the north end of the two-story wing will be an overhead iron bridge, starting at the curb line of Third West street, gaining with easy steps a height to pass over all trains, termi-nating at Fourth West street. The building is to be fireproof throughout, the exterior walls being of brick, and the interior columns, floor girders, as well as the floor of rein-forced concrete. All of the trusses supporting the roof will be of steel, al-so the entire concourse and train shed. with roof covered with asbestos.
