That, *Whereas*, In the Third District Court for said Territory, said defendant was adjudged guilty of murder in the first degree, and was afterwards by the Court sentenced to be shot to death on the thirteenth day of June, 1884, and whereas, it appears the Supreme Court have affirmed said judgment and sentence, and whereas, a writ of error from said judgment and sentence has lssued from the Supreme Court execution; about the exercis-of a doubtful power upon issued from the Supreme Court of the United States to re-prieve said sentence, and an application to the Supreme Court of the execution; about the exercis-ing of a doubtful power upon its part, and we have come to the conclusion, unanimously, as I said be-fore, to adhere to its former decision in the matter; but the Court unites unanimously in recommending to the Governor that he grant a reprieve. There is no question about his power; there is no question then but what the sentence and judgment remains until reversed by the proper tribunal, and the Utah Territory for a stay of said execution pending the hearing of said writ has been refused, and the said Court has caused to be certified to this Department its opinion that the right to said stay is a debateable one, and have unanimously recommend-ed that this department re-spite the said defendant until said writ may be brought to a hearing in the said Supreme Court of the United States; and whereas it is absointely necessary that persons accused or convicted of crime shall have opportunity to exhaust all remedies provided for by law in their behalf.
