STAKE CONFERENCE.

Attempted Tribune Sensation Had No. Faundation in Fact.

Special Correspondents. Logan, Cache Co., Oct. 31.—The quar-terly conference of the Cache stake convened in the tabernacle yesterday. Besides the local presiding authorities there were present Elder Seymour B. Young of the Seventies and Dr. J. M. Tanner of the Church schools.

After the usual opening exercises, Prest. Joseph Morrell welcomed the people to conference and spoke of the avorable conditions which surround the people of this stake at the present time. The past summer has been a very fa-vorable one for all. Harvests have been bounteous and farmers are able to dispose of all their surplus products at good prices. The people generally are trying to do right as is evident from the spirit in which they meet all of their obligations. The tithes and offer-ings continued to show an increase over other years. All of the stake organi-zations are doing good work along their respective lines and are rendering valunble assistance to the general progress of the work. There are in the stake at the present time 7,269 members. The stake maintains 70 missionaries in the world. During the year there has been 100 couples wed in the stake and 211

births Supt. J. E. Carlisla reported the con-dition of the Sunday schools of the stake and outlined the work done and what is contemplated for the future.

President Lucy Cardon reported the Relief Societies of the stake. At presat there are 900 members enrolled. Besides the general relief work done among the poor the society was doing omething towards storing grain. The society now owns nine good graneries and has 4,500 bushels of wheat stored in them and has \$400 in cash on hand with which to purchase more grain.

Bishop Anthon Anderson of the Sec-ond ward reported his ward as proressing nicely. There are 667 members in his ward, and all of the organizations

are in good working order. Dr. J. M. Tanner spoke of the favor-able report made by President Morreil. and from what he had seen himself he feit that the people of Cache were cer-tainly a blest people. He had recently visited the Saints in Canada and found the people there suffering from the ef-fects of the drouth that had prevalled throughout that region the past sum-

mer. The crops there were hardly a tithe of what they should have been. and the same condition existed in New Mexico and Arizona but for all this.

Auxillary Sugar Plant In Full Operation -Ladies' Social-Quiet Politics.

The weighing and care of the beet sheds is under the supervision of Mr. Herbert Snell, while the care of the factory con-taining the machinery is entrusted with Mr. Weiliam Cauthor assisted in corre-Mr. William Gardner, assisted in some respects by Mr. Henry Gardner. There has been received during the last ten days an average of 1,200 tons of beets per day, weighed from the wagons, and 150 tons per day received by rail. The beet sheds are all full, and if beets come in during the week as in the past week there will be no place to store them The slicer handles some 400 tons per day, so that considerable time will elapse before the work for the season
