That the people of Salt Lake do not favor making the city schools a portion of any political organization, to be used as a whip on other political affairs, was demonstrated at the election yesterday.

The entire non-partisan ticket was elected: It returns to office four members of the board for another term, and adds to this board for another term, and adds to this body the name of James T. Hammond, former secretary of state, and a man much interested in school affairs for their own sake. school affairs for their own sake. The ticket elected, with the majori-ties each man received, is as follows: First Ward-Byron Cummings, 139. Second Ward-M. J. Cheesman, 241. Third Ward-William Newman, 706. Fourth Ward-J. T. Hammond, 476. Fith Ward-H. P. Henderson, no context contest.

FIGHT IN FIRST.

The hardets fight in the city was in the First precinct, where the organi-zation was perfected to defeat Byron Cummings on a policy of revenge in behalf of City Recorder J. B. The offi-cial count today, given out by Clerk Judd, makes his majority 241 votes in-trand of 159 as anneared on the sistead of 159, as appeared on the es-timates last night. This was because the vote in the Twelfth district became reversed in the estimates made by the press, and Geddes received the benefit

of the Cheesman majority. Samuel Barlow received so small a vote in the Third that even he was startled. The struggle in the Fourth turned

out to be a pretty one, with Hammond so far in the lead that the interest lay in catching the distance by which he defeated his competitor. The majority was 476.

TO RECONSTRUCT PLANT.

Important Improvements Decided Upon by Directors of U. L. & R. R.

The executive committee of the Utah Light & Railway company held a meeting of considerable local interest yestreday afternoon, when it was decided to completely reconstruct the company's gas plant at an outlay of half a million dollars during the coming spring. The daily gas production is at present 300,000 cubic ft., and it is proposed to increase this to one mil-

lion Estimates amounting to \$2,500,000 for improving the street rallway system were submitted by General Manager Wells, including \$600,000 for an additional steam power plant, and increasing the present available horse power capacity to perhaps 25,000. New barn and shops are to be built, as the pres ent quarters on Second East street, are inadequate to the demand.
