MUNICIPAL MATTERS.

Pitney Catch Rains, a Strong Theme For Discussion.

CAN BUILD BAY WINDOWS.

Another Span of Horses and an Electric for the Fire Department—Leave of Absence for Cohn.

The City Council met as usual last evening with President McCord in the chair. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved, after which the following petitions were presented:

From C. H. L. Jensen asking for five horses to run express wagon. Referred to committee on Finance.

From George Johnson by Charles J. Hildreth, asking permission to lay a private pipe from the main in the corner of Eighth and B streets to connect with his property. Referred to engineering committee.

From Utah division J. A. W. asking permission to build a track in Liberty Park. Committee on public safety and city engineer included.

From Smith Drug company, asking for five months extension on the license and a water certificate of \$1250 on account of recent fire. Granted.

The Utah Holographic Co. asked to be allowed to do business in the corner of Third West and First South. Committee on streets with power to act.

The health commissioner called attention to the claims arising from the City of Chicago, the city of their liability in suits under the common law.

The committee on sanitary rules and regulations asked that the same be referred to the health commissioner.

Young, as chairman of the irrigation committee that had been in charge of the project, asked that the same be referred to the committee on streets.

The matter of the alleged clothing Co. asking permission to build a bay window, was referred to the committee on public safety and city engineer.

A very voluminous minority report, citing legal authorities, was filed by the city attorney and discussed by the engineer, setting forth that it was a mistake to allow the window to be built in view of existing laws. The majority report was adopted.

The committee on municipal laws, in considering the recommendation of the attorney for a suspension between the city and the common council, thought the compromise should be accepted. The damage claim was \$51,725.45 and the city's position at the compromise was \$12,500. The report was adopted and the amount placed on a special appropriation list.

The report of the fire and police committee recommending the purchase of a span of horses at a cost of \$1000, and the employing of an electrician at a salary of \$250 per month, was adopted.

Section 25, chapter 15 of the city ordinance, relating to bay windows, was amended by making it read that the ordinance should not apply to bay windows already erected in course of erection at the time of passing said ordinance.

On resolution of Cohn, the city will purchase three horses of the Union to lay a line from the main in the corner of Eighth and B streets to the Smith Drug company.
