POWER OF TRUTH.

Newspaper's Influence Measured by Its Accuracy in the News.

The power of the press to mold pub-lic opinion has often been spoken of. Papers have been read before public assemblages, and orators have spoken in beautiful language, all telling of what is briefly termed "the power of the press." Indeed, newspapers themselves have not been slow to present information or ar-guments along that line that would tend to confirm the view that the press is a mighter force.

suments along that line that would tend to confirm the view that the press is a mighty force. Yet today, while there are many news-papers whose editorial uiterances are re-garded by the public, there are also many papers whose uiterances are disregarded. Fifty years ago the news features of to-day's newspapers were almost unknown, and the editorial uiterance was the chief claim for patronage. The editor did a large part of the thinking for the com-munity because perhaps through the oth-er papers received at his office he was generally believed to be in closer touch with the great world than almost any other citizen. And so we had the power of the press. But times have changed, and newspap-ers have also changed. Today people still want to know what the editor thinks, but first and foremost they want the news-the facts, the truth. The power of the press is only maintained when the truth stands pre-eminent. The press is not powerful if the people do not believe in the prospies or if the press has misled the people in the past.-Zanesville, (O.), Signal.
