The Salt Lake Route will divided into two divisions and after April 1, with Calients as the dividing point. Everyhing east of the west switch in the Gliente yards will be Salt Lake diviion and everything west of it, will be the Los Angeles division. The Los Angeles division now contains Las Veas at which point the Las Vegas & Tonopah branches off to the north. Enthusiastic Meeting the Feature In Packard Library Building

COMMITTEES ARE APPOINTED

To Carry Out the Work of Improving Conditions Generally-Some Good Speeches Delivered.

An enthusiastic meeting of the Woman's league was held yesterday, at the Packard hall, in the Free Library building, with the president Mrs. Mc-

Some miscellaneous business was disussed following which the afternoon was devoted to addresses by Dr. T. B. Beatty, Frank B. Stephens and John D. Spencer. During the business ses-sion, a motion was made by Mrs. E. E. Shepherd, that the league should present to the city council last night a proposition that the league should take care of the detention home for a year's period, at least, after which the situa-tion would necessarily adjust itself. She said that the delay in regard to the home seemed to arise about the choice of a superintendent, politics being a feature of the choice. A discussion fol-lowed, each speaker being in favor of the question, as all believed that poli-tics should not enter into the project, and that the council might perhaps consider it a matter of relife to have the league end the troublesome problem. Beatty, Frank B. Stephens and John league end the troublesome problem. The motion carried and other business pertaining to the work of the various committees was considered, after which Mrs. McMahon in a happy speech in-troduced Dr. Beatty.

SANITARY REFORM.

The speaker gave his opinion of what the league might do from a medical standpoint for the city in the way of agitating for sanitary reform and oth-er important matters. He declared that there were sacrificed in Utah alone 2,000 children annually to the evil of unsanitary food, and other unhealthy agencies, which with sufficient agitation might be remedied. Besides the mor-Inight be remedied. Besides the mor-tuary havoc wrought through negli-gence of simple rules and conditions of health, there was the danger of in-fecting children with disease and all-ments from which they would always suffer. Believed that each child had a right to enter life properly equipped with health and strength. Said health was the pormal and natural heritage with health and strength. Said health was the normal and natural heritage of humanity, disease the unnatural, and it needs only a sufficient attention in proper lines to secure to them this prectous heritage. Spoke of the dis-couraging results of efforts made in the past to have the legislature take up these questions of hygenetic and medi-cal reform; and said he believed that women would win where "mere men" had failed. A great factor in the possi-ble effectment of reforms was their right to vote as they could help choose men for office who would interest themmen for office who would interest them-

selves in these vital questions. J. D. SPENCER ON REFORM. John D. Spencer followed with a talk upon what the league could expect in the way of co-operation from business men in the way of their proposed re-forms. He affirmed that in the first place men were busy too often with sellish concerns; had not time, they thought to "waste" on matters which

selish concerns; had not time, they thought to "waste" on matters which do not materially affect their line of "business;" but he believed it would be the province and power of the league to show the business man that the moral reforms aimed at by this body would affect him vitally in his material interests as well as others. Stephens was the next speaker and his topic was what he be-lieved the league could do in a legal direction for the moral betterment of Salt Lake. He thought perhaps the league should not expect to accom-plish too much, in a municipal way. There were conditions which had ex-isted since the world began, and the league should content itself with an ef-fort to ameliorate these conditions. He said that the chief thing was educa-tion; when it became a matter of per-sonal conviction that a thing was wrong then radical reform could be looked for. He declared much could be ef-fected along physical lines; get people used to better conditions, agitate for better municipal laws. Take the all night saloon; this evil could be abolished with a very little agitation; saloon keepers themselves were not in favor of it; and the restriction of its open hours might mean salvation to many a man. Another thing that might be secured was a law securing public playgrounds for the children of the city. There is just so much energy and spirit in the growing child; it must have its outlet in some way. There is always the chance of having this misdirected. Give children a spot where this excess can have innocent play—it is all they want. Children are not as a rule inherently vicious. They need only healthy opportunities for ex-ercise and effort to direct their ener-gies in the right way. Public play-rounds under the charge of efficient furnis, gymnastics, and other sports will be a reformative agency in any will be a reformative agency in any of vice. All the great organizations which haim to provide a healthful em-ployment for mind and body are great freators for civic progress. CANNOT FIND THE ROBBER.

Daring Bandit Who Rifled Mail Bags On Oriental Limited Still Free.

Spokane, Wash., March 16 .- The train robher who overpowered the railway mail on the Great Northern westbound main on the Great Northern westbound train early Sunday Morning between Bonner's Ferry, Ida., and Spokane, secured only \$2.40 for his six hours' work, according to the statement of the post-office inspectors who have spent the past 24 hours checking over the mail. There was not a single consignment of cur-rency from banks in the mails, and the robber left all the checks, drafts, and stocks he found in the mail, as well as all jewelry. Every letter has been checked over with the exception of one from a small eastern town, and this may have contained \$5 or \$10.
