Revolution Expected on Murder of King Carlos Did Not Follow.

PREMER FRANCO IS DICTATOR.

Lisbon Seems Prostrated With Grief Yet Subdued Excitement Pervades the City.

Assassins Under Arrest Maintain Sullen Silence-High Personages Said to be Involved.

Lisbon, Feb, 2 .- A boy king, who henceforth will be known as Manuel II, is tonight the ruler of the kingdom of Portugal, and the revolution into which the instigators of the bloody events of yesterday had hoped to plunge the country has not up to the present engulfed the nation.

Franco, the dictator and real commander of the country's destinies, whom the moral and physical might of all parties and powerful interests has not succeeded in destroying, remains still the triumphant leader, not only unconquered and unaffrighted, but reiniconduction and and with the king, deter-nined at all hazards and at all costs to prevent further violence and insur-rection and to preserve the monarchy. That the monarchy will continue there seems no doubt at this moment. The leaders of all the monarchist par-ties, from the most conservative to those where the most advanced ideas prevail, have reached a complete agree-ment to this effect, and they are bend-ing all their efforts toward the maintenance of order in the country.

MANUEL'S ACCESSION.

Tomorrow the Official Gazette will announce the accession to the throne of Prince Manuel, who, with the queen mother, had an almost miraculous esmother, had an almost miraculous es-cape from death in the storm of bul-lets which poured into the royal car-riage yesterday. His wounds, which at first were believed to be serious, proved to be of comparatively slight consequence, and today he is well on the road to complete recovery. It is confidently believed that this young man [a big acrossion to the throne, will confidently believed that this young man, in his accession to the throne, will find his great task considerably light-ened owing to the fact that he is known to be of a charming, sympathetic na-ture, which has always been a delight to those about him. Even with his wounds and amid the dreadful scenes which accompanied and followed the tragedy, the young prince has preserved a demeanor of utmost dignity. His wounded arm is carried in a sling, but he makes light of the own hurts and he makes light of the own hurts and protests that he suffers no pain what-

ASSASSINS SILENT. The assussins who are under arrest are maintaining a stolid silence. The police are pursuing an exhaustive in-vestigation, and it is declared that the arrests of high personages implicated in the plot will be made shortly. The government has adopted most thorough measures to block the escape from Portugal of suspects. Premier Franco has telegraphed to the Spanish government requesting.

The number of persons now under arrest in various forts, many of whom were taken into custody prior to the assassinations, is very great. The prisoners in Fort Caxis have refused to accept the food given them, declaring that it is unfit to eat. Two of the remaining dend regicides have been identified as store clerks, one being named Alfredo Costa. At a meeting of the council of state tonight Premier Franco and the chief of the Progressists and Regenerationist parties offered the king their support for a coalition ministry, which the king accepted.

accepted. The cabinet has resigned, and it is understood that Admiral Ferreira do Amaral will form a coalition cobinet. This action indicates that the oppo-nents of Premier Franco have decided temporarily to abandon their differ-ences and unite with him in an attempt to save the monarchy.

Vienna, Feb. 2 .- The statement was made at the Portuguese legation today that the assassing of the king were an-archists, and not subjects of the Fortaguese monarchy. Rumors have been circulating on the continent that Dom Miguel is not far from the Portuguese frontier at the present moment, awaiting developments, buy his relatives emphatically deny this. QUEEN AMELIE'S BROTHER.

The king has instructed the colone of the Castilla regiment, of which King Carlos was an honorary colonel, to pro-cede to Lisbon and watch at the bier of the dead sovereign.

Madrid, Feb. 2.—The assassination yesterday of King Carlos and Crown Prince Luiz Philippe has created gen-eral sorrow in Spain, but at the same time it has awakened the fears that once obtained that a recrudence of anarchistic deeds is not improbable in this monarchy where a promaganda of

Especially in Euroelona, where the sharchists and revolutionists are nota-bly powerful, did the news of the as-sassination cause great excitement. These facts induced the government today to take a firm grip on the Span-ish situation, with the intention of fore-stalling a possible outbreak of violence on the monarchy. A meeting of the council of state was held today, at which it was decided to observe es-pecial precautions at the frontier, and right rules will be enforced concerning the passage across the frontier of indi-viduals, traffic and merchandise. Immediately after the council of state had concluded its sessions Premier Maura left for Sevolle by special train for a consultation with King Alfonso.

The foreign office today gave out a statement saying that the assassins numbered six, all of them being armed with carbines and revolvers. They were paid by political agitators, ene-mies of the government. One of the slain regicides was a Frenchman, ac-cording to the statement, and encirc-ling his body was a belt filled with gold, the profit for his share in the murderous act. Simultaneously with the assassina-tion, the statement also says, an armed band surrounded the home of Pro-mier Franco in the outskirts of the city, but was beaten off by the guard. EXPRESSES DEEP SORROW

Washington, Feb. 1.—Official news of the assassination of King Carlos and the crown prince of Portugal was received here late tonight through a cablegram from Minister Bryan at Lisbon, which conveyed the simple an-nowncement of the commission of tho crime. President Roosevelt was at once notified by Acting Seey. of State Bacon and expressed his deep sorrow. Bacon and expressed his deep sorrow. He tomorrow will send his formal ex-pressions of grief to the royal family. Government officials and members of the diplomatic corps were shocked at the news, and on every hand were heard words of sorrow over the tragic ending of Portugal's monarch and heir

KAISER MUCH DISTURBED.

Berlin, Feb. 2.--News of the assas-sination of the king of Portugal and the crown prince was telephoned to the



imperial palace by a semi-official news agency shortly after 5 o'clock this morning. An official dispatch relating to the tragedy had come through some time before from the German legation at Lisbon to the foreign office, but was still in the hands of the translators, When the mices news was commun. when the priss news was communi-cated to the emperor by the adjutant on duty at 6 o'clock in the morning, the emperor was greatly distressed, as he was especially fond of the crown prince, of whom he saw much during his visit to Portugal in 1965. on learning of the tragedy, sent tele-grams of warm sympathy to Guest Amelle in her becavement. The in-tended visits of their majesties to the courts of Denmark and Norway, and also the next court at Buckingham palace, have been cancelled as a token of respect for the memory of the king

of respect for the memory of the king and prince. Dispatches from Lisbon say that the strictest censorship is still maintained by the government, and in conse-quence the official report that the dssassins were anarchists instead of Republicans, is received with reserve here. The censored telegrams state the effect of the assassinations has been to strengthen the monarchist feeling among the misses, and that the army spirit and discipline are per-fect. Statements regarding political conditions in Portugal will be regard-ed suspiciously throughout Europe un-

conditions in Portugal will be regard-ed suspiciously throughout Europe un-til news through uncensored channels becomes available. An unconfirmed news agency dis-patch dated Lisbon, declares that an-other sensational episode occurred this afternoon, when a party of armed Ke-publicans attacked the residence of Premier Franco. The dispatch says that the military guarding the pre-mier's residence exchanged a fusiliade with the Republicans, wounding sev-eral of them.

The cowardly shooting of the king in the back calls forth words of execra-tion on the regicides, while the gov-erument declares that the murders will only strengthen the cause of the mon-archy and insure the fidelity of the people. The army apparently still is loyal, and no organized movement of the Republicans to launch a republic is under way, so far as outward apunder way, so far as outward ap-

pearances go. Nevertheless, subdued excitement betvades the city, whose population still are fearful that yesterday's crimes will be followed by more bloodshed and are only the prelude to a series of na-tional disasters.

ALL PORTUGAL MOURNS.

All Portugal is overwhelmed today at the killing of the king and the crown prince. Though torn by inter-nal dissension in the past few months. nal dissension in the past few months, terrorized by acts of crime and blood-shed, uprisings in the streets, out-rages with knife and bomb and al-ways fearful lest these signs of revo-lution would culminate in some dread-ful outburst of passion, Portugal was not prepared for the blow that fell yesterday when the king and prince were shot to dealth in a public place, where thousands had gathered to greet their home-coming.

where thousands had gathered to greet their home-coming. All last night Queen Amelie, in the royal palace, sat between the biers where rested the bodies of her hus-band and her son, prostrated with grief. Troops guarded the palace; a squadron of cavalry surrounded the house in which Premier Franco passed the night; special details were drawn up before public buildings, and re-serves were quartered in barracks ready for a call that might come to spring to arms.

But Lisbon did not sleep. Scarcely a soul throughout the city closed eyes. An unnatural silence pervaded the place, for after the first awakening to the tragedy that had been enacted, with its attendant noises and confu-sion, shore and cafes were closed, the sion, shops and cafes were closed; th doors of theaters were hastily locked, houses were barricaded and the streets were cleared. No one might say where the next blow would fall, and

where the next blow would fall, and revolution that sweeps through a city like a fire in dry places drove the peo-ple into their homes or other places where they might be secure. The attack on the royal family, how-ever, had the opposite effect from that most feared, and peace and quiet reigned as though no murder had been done. SYMPATHY OF POPE PIUS.

The pope was most distressed this morning when Cardinal Merry del Val comunincated to him the tragedy in NEWS OF ASSASSINATION. The news of the assassination spread like widire, and thousands of people, bewildered and terrified, poured into the streets. Soon the troops and police occupied all the prominent places and the people hurried to their pomes and barricaded the doors and

all its details, "Poor Amelle," said the holy father; "she may now really be called the Saint Queen."

After serding a telegram of condoplaces and the people hurried to their nomes and barricaded the doors and windows to await in fear the unknown future. The strictest measures were taken by the officers in charge of the troops to suppress the sligntest sign of disorder, but their work was light. There have been no disturbances in Lisbon in the last 24 hours, and Sunday passed off only in the deep-est gloom, with the populace mourning on every hand. The bodies of the king and crown prince rest in the royal palace, and be-side them the queen sat throughout the night, sometimes with her hand pressing the forehead of King Carlos and sometimes stroking the face of the dead crown prince.
