sharpest fall is three feet in six, which, however is only for 200 feet. The grade above this fall is gradu-ally accommodated so that the force of the descent is much diminished. This really marvelous even-ness of grade makes a jam-that bugbear of mest flume works-almost impossible. The flume is of the V shape

made of 24-inch planks two inches in thickness, and has a capacity of at least 500 cords of fire-wood per day, or 500,000 feet of timber. In several respects it differs from any

flume yet constructed, and has een rather more expensive in conquence, as it is intended to last at least twelve years. To gain a uniform grade (an in i peusable requisite in so precipitous a country, where heavy timber is to be floated), it was found necessary to build the flume on trestle-work and stringers from one end to the other.
