Wednesday, 16.

COUNCIL.

Councilor Thurber, chairman of the committee appointed to make arrangements for public printing, recommended that Wm. C. Dunbar, of Salt Lake City, be elected public printer; report accepted and committee discharged. The recommendation of the committee was adopted, and a communication being almost simultaneously received from the House that Wm. C. Dunbar had been elected Public Printer, the Council concurring, the action of the House was concurred in.

On motion of Councilor Burton, the freedom of the chamber was extended to the U. S. officials and some other prominent gentlemen.

HOUSE.

The apportionment of the Governor's message was referred to the appropriate committees.

Mr. Murdock, chairman of the committee on printing, recommended the election of Mr. W. C. Dunbar for public printer; report accepted, and the Council concurring, W. C. Dunbar was elected public printer.

City Council.—The Council met last evening, Mayor Little presiding.

Crow and Bowring and 26 others petitioned for the exemption from license tax of all articles manufactured within the limits of the corporation and sold by the makers. Referred to the committee on license.

W. B. Hibbard, superintendent Western Union Telegraph Company, and 50 other business men and firms, asked that houses in the city be numbered. Referred to the committee on improvements.

Michael McGregor and 24 others, asked by petition that the canal on 7th West street, be flumed on 1st North street, and two foot bridges be swung across said canal. Referred to the committee on streets and alleys.

L. E. Bamberger petitioned for an auctioneer's license for one year. Granted.

The chief engineer of the fire department presented his annual report for the year 1877. Received and referred to the committee on fire department.

The committee on claims, associated with the chairman of the committee on streets and alleys, to whom was referred the petition of Keyser and Moritz, asking for a reimbursement of \$300 for public street improvements made by them in the vicinity of their brewery, reported adversely thereon, recommending that the prayer be not granted. Adopted.

The committee on waterworks presented the following report:

Your committee to whom was referred the petition of H. P. Kimball and 29 others, asking that a water main be laid over the hill from City Creek cañon, report, that they have considered the above petition in connection with others

on the same subject, wherein citizens have proposed to pay part of the expense in laying the water mains to their premises. We acknowledge the generous offer made by citizens who need the water, and regret that the city is not in a position at present to grant the prayer of the petitioners. Should it be deemed expedient by your honorable body to accept any such propositions, we recommend that the contributors be reimbursed by having the same applied on their water license as the same shall become due.

The waterworks to date have cost about \$180,000, the most of which has been paid out of the license fees and city taxes. We do not think it is just and equitable to use for the extension of the water mains, taxes paid by persons so situated that they derive no benefit therefrom. We believe that the only just and equitable plan for the extension of the water mains is by levying a local tax on all property where the mains are laid and hydrants erected for fire protection, that the tax so levied and collected should be used exclusively for the extension of the water mains to other parts of the city. We are satisfied that the citizens in any part of the city will be willing to pay a reasonable local tax, whenever the mains are laid past their premises, and hydrants erected for the protection of their property. It is the opinion of some that the city charter does not authorize a local tax for this purpose. If it does not we recommend that the legislature be asked to so amend the charter, as to grant this power.

There is another subject connected with the water works to which we wish to call your attention. When the first ordinance was passed regulating the water supply, all persons taking the water were required to pay for the service pipe from the centre of the street to their premises. Subsequently the ordinance was changed and water takers were only required to take the water from the curbstone. We think, in justice to those who paid from the centre of the street that they should be reimbursed, and all persons using the water made as near equal as possible. To accomplish this we present for your consideration the accompanying resolution.

The report was accepted, and the recommendations were taken up in their order, and considered. Action on the first recommendation, in reference to contributions, was deferred; the second, in regard to a local tax, was referred to the committee on municipal laws, with the city attorney associated; the third was adopted, to be carried into effect by a resolution to be presented hereafter.

The Council adjourned till next Tuesday evening, at 6.30 o'clock.

The Work in Scotland.—The annual Conference of the Glasgow (Scotland) Branch of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, took place on December 30, in the Great Western Hall, 34 Tron-gate, in that city.

Smallpox Cure.—A year or two since we published a recipe copied from an exchange, for the cure of smallpox. It has been since frequently asserted in numbers of public journals, and by individuals that its efficacy has been frequently demonstrated. It simply consists of cream of tartar, boiled in water and allowed to cool, an ounce to the pint, and allow the patient to drink freely of the solution. It is said also to act as a preventive where a person is exposed to infection or contagion.

Irrigation.—As soon as the ground is sufficiently soft, work will be resumed upon the three important irrigating canals over Jordan, the West Jordan, North Jordan and South Jordan. The title first named has been changed from the "Utah and Salt Lake Canal." Mr. Jesse W. Fox and party have been at work recently making the necessary surveys.

Those extensive irrigation ditches will cause that part of the country over Jordan to soon become like "a fruitful field."

North.—About 50 car loads of iron for the Utah Northern Railroad extension have been dispatched to the end of the track. The work on it will be vigorously pushed in the spring.

On Tuesday Mr. James Cassin, freight conductor on the C. P. R. R. had the thumb and forefinger of his right hand badly mashed, by accident, at the Promontory. The thumb was subsequently amputated by Dr. Adams, of Ogden, and it is hoped the finger will be saved.

Not Very Nice.—In the western part of the city we are informed there is a large hog pen, belonging to some prominent citizens. Through it runs a canal, and some distance below is an ice pond, which is not a nice pond. Of course if people prefer their ice flavored with hog excrement, this is a free country. At the same time we don't think that "ignorance is bliss" in such a matter, and we draw attention to that hog pen for the benefit of people who have been putting up supplies of ice from the pond mentioned for next summer's use. Cholera and ice are apt to go together when the latter article is impregnated with impurities.

Admitted.—This morning [Judge E. D. Hoge made a motion, in the Supreme Court, for the admission as an attorney at the bar of Mr. Milford B. Shipp, of this city. The matter was referred to Judges Hoge, McBride and Bennett, as a committee of examination. Those gentlemen reported favorably, this afternoon, and Mr. Shipp sailed right into the bar accordingly. The report of the committee reflected very creditably on the legal attainments and qualifications of the applicant. Mr. S. has been a close student, which, combined with his good natural abilities should enable him to be successful in the legal profession.

COUNCIL.

January 16th.

The Auditor of Public Accounts submitted a report of amounts due jurors, witnesses, etc., for fees for services rendered after the amount appropriated for that purpose was exhausted. The same officer also submitted a report of the Penitentiary for 1876-77. Both were referred to the appropriate committees.
