Another terrible deed has been added to the long list of crimes lately committed in this city. Last evening, at a few minutes before 7 o'clock, one R. J. O'Brien, formerly called "Mickey," was shot by a saloon keeper in the capacity of a night switchman, while on the way to his work, entered the "Western" saloon on Fifth West Street, between Second and Third South Streets, and was fatally shot by F. F. Raymond, one of the proprietors.

A SALOON KEEPER DID IT.

The details of what occurred after O'Brien's entrance into the saloon are difficult to gather. A reporter of the News visited the place this morning with a view to obtain correct information concerning the tragic affair, but the bartender was not over anxious to express himself about the matter. It is said there were several eye witnesses to the shooting, but for reasons probably best known to themselves they all disappeared, and their versions of the story may never be known unless they are located by the officers and made to testify by Raymond's preliminary examination or trial.

The circumstances seem to be these. As O'Brien entered the saloon two men were engaged in playing a game of pool. He was invited to take a drink with them, which he did. For a short time the play went smoothly enough, but was suddenly terminated by one of the players accusing the other of cheating. This caused a party to be ejected from the saloon, and a storm of ugly epithets. O'Brien, who is represented as being a peaceable and law-abiding citizen, smilingly enquired where the saloon was located, and if it was not a little better, O'Brien was informed that it was not.

A MILD CLIMATE.

Letter From a Correspondent in Southern Arizona.

TRUCON, ARIZONA, Dec. 15, 1930. It seems strange to me in Southern Arizona to read of snow and severe cold in the north, for here snow is unknown, save that once or twice during the winter the peaks of the Santa Catalina Mountains (eighteen or twenty miles north), or the Santa Rita, slaty hills south, show a glittering crest for a few days at a time.

A MILD CLIMATE.

The Tucson roses and other tender plants in the garden are all winter. Walking about town today I saw gardens blooming with all kinds of roses among them, and trees still green. Mulberries and umbrellas trees have cast their leaves, but fig, peach and cottonwood trees are still green, the latter being in leaf all winter. The vegetable gardens are luxuriant, with never ceasing growths of all kinds, principally beans, radishes, turnips, and so on.

A MILD CLIMATE.

Tucson is the second oldest town in America, having been known as a town since 1590. The Spaniards in the early days established a mission there. It was then an old Indian town, but Tucson does not seem to thrive very well, and seems to lack the vital energy needed for its prosperity. About three fourths of the population are Mexicans, whose outlook is gloomy and lack of energy are very apparent. They are of untold numbers—manana—everything that can be postponed.

A MILD CLIMATE.

With Latter-day Saints citizens, and with this delightful and pleasantly healthful climate, Southern Utah might become a terrestrial paradise. Especially in this true of the Salt River Valley, at Mesa, Tempe, Lodi, Nephel and other villages of the Saints, whose altitude is much less than that of Tucson, which is 2400 feet above sea level, while Mesa and neighboring places are only about 1000 feet.

A MILD CLIMATE.

This low altitude renders Salt River Valley well adapted to the growth of oranges and lemons, of which about 5,000 were planted during the winter of 1929-30. For grapes and figs it is much better than California, owing to the absence of frosts, which are quite a detriment in the State in the rainy season.
