## HUNTSVILLE PEOPLE OPPOSE RESERVOIR

Committee Circulating Petition Against Construction of Power Dam.

CONFLICTING SENTIMENTS.

Will be Aired in Mass Meeting in Ogden Tabernacle Saturday-Means Much for Farmers.

Ogden, Nov. 29 .- At a meeting held in Huntsville last night, which was attended by about 50 of the leading citizens, a vigorous protest was entered against the granting of the petition of the Utah Light & Railway company for the changing of the county road at the head of the Ogden canyon, to make way for the proposed large storage reservoir. It was the sense of the meeting that the Power company did not mean business, and petitions were drafted which will be circulated throughout the Ogden valley, after which they will be presented to the county commissioners by a committee of four, which was appointed at the meeting. Another delegation was meeting. Indicate the representatives of the meeting at the mass meeting to be held in Ogden on Saturday next. In the meantime petitions are also being circulated by those who favor the project, and the mass meeting on Satur-

It is claimed by these who oppose the building of the dam that the condition building of the dam that the condition for the people residing in the Ogden canyon and a greater portion of the city of Ogden would be practically the same as that of the residents of Johnstown, Pa., prior to the memorable flood, which almost wiped that city from the map. They assert that bed rock cannot be found at the point where it is proposed to build the dam and for this reason the dam would be unsafe. They also maintain that the loss to the resi-dents of the valley would be far greater than the benefits to be derived from the same, to say nothing of the unsanitary ondition that they claim follow with penning up of the large amount of

On the other hand, it is claimed that the construction of the dam would be the biggest thing for Weber county that could happen at this time, and that no proposition since the construction of the pipe line through Ogden canyon means so much for Ogden City and Weber county as this. Not only does it mean that every acre of the barren waste in the county can be reclaimed, but that there will be plenty of water for all power purposes, for many years It is claimed that the outlay. the dam is built, will reach about half a million dollars. The board of county commissioners has virtually ap-proved the scheme, but did not desire to officially sanction it until they heard the sentiment of the people, who after all must decide whether or not the project shall go through. If the objection is sufficient to warrant a refusal of the petition asked for, it is quite likely that the power company will go to the Snake river in Idaho for their power and abandon the irrigation plan for the Salt Lake valley in Weber county.

#### IN PRISON ON THE AMUR. American Scalers Who Were Captured

By Russians.

Victoria, B. C., Nov. 28.—Robert Findlay and Charles Grant, sealers, who were captured by Russians when on the Japanese sealer Hokusei Maru, confirm the reports published some months ago that C. T. R. Thompson of San Francisco, George McCamish of San Francisco, Edward McNeil of Victoria and Joseph Krances Weilly of Victoria and Joseph Krances Weill of Victoria and Victoria toria and Joseph Knapp of Washington, as well as a native of Guam, are in prison at Khabarovsk, on the Amur river. ### ROOT SITS DOWN ON FILIBUSTERS.

Secretary Has No Advice to Give Those in the Isle of Pines.

BELONGS TO CUBAN REPUBLIC

Never Has Been American Territory And is no Way of Establishing a Territorial Government.

Washington, Nov. 28 .- The administration dashed the hopes of the little band of American colonists on the Isle of Pines, who have been working toward the separation of the island from Cuba and its inclusion in the United States, when Secy. Root, after consultation with the president, made public the text of a letter which he had addressed to Charles Maynard, president of the American club of the Isle of Pines, defining the attitude of the United States government toward the proposed formation of a territorial government in the island as a part of the United States.

The secretary was most pointed in the statements in his letter, which is as follows:

"I have received your letter of Oct. 25, in which you say: 'Kindly advise me at your earliest convenience the necessary procedure to establish a territorial form of government for Isle of Pines, West Indies, U. S. A. "It is not part of the duty of the secretary of state to give advice upon such subjects. I think it proper, however, to answer your inquiry so far as it may be necessary to remove an er-ror under which you appear to be rest-ing concerning the status of the Isle Pines and your rights as residents of that island. "There is no procedure by which

you and your associates can lawfully establish a territorial government in that island. The island is lawfully subject to the control and government of the republic of Cuba, and you and your associates are bound to render obedience to the laws of that country so long as you remain in the island. It you fail in that obedience you will justly be liable to prosecution in the Cuban courts and to such punishment as may be provided by the laws of Cuba for such offense as you commit. "You are not likely to have any greater power in the future. The

greater power in the future. The treaty now pending before the senate, if approved by that body, will relinquish all claim of the United States to the Isle of Pines. In my judgment the United States has no substantial claim to the Isle of Pines. The treaty merely accords to Cuba what is hers in accordance with international law and justice. and justice.
"At the time of the treaty of peace.

which ended the war between the Unit-ed States and Spain, the Isle of Pines was, and had been for several centur-ies, a part of Cuba. I have no doubt whatever that it continues to be a part of Cuba and that it is not and never has been territory of the United States. This is the view with which President Roosevelt authorized the pending treaty and made and signed it, and I expect to urge its confirmation. pending treaty put an end to the cor trol of Cuba over the island. A treat directly contrary to the one now pe ing would be necessary to do the and there is not the slightest prospect of such a treaty being made. You may be quite sure that Cuba will never consent to give up the Isle of Pines and that the United States will never try to compel her to give it up against her will.
