

to construct the Texas Pacific Road. At the extra session of Congress 11 bills were introduced providing for government aid in constructing the road. Brown says his company was not instrumental in having those bills introduced, and that it has no interest in any of them. The company is now engaged in building the line, and expects to be able to complete it without pecuniary aid from the government.

General Grant has telegraphed that he can postpone other engagements and will therefore be the President's guest on the 19th, at the unveiling of the statue of Gen. Thomas.

NEW YORK, 29.—At a meeting of the Farmers Club yesterday, Vice-Prest. Dodge read a memorial paper prepared by the committee on Agent Meeker. He said it was singular that the newspapers should have been instrumental in killing a newspaper man. Meeker felt that at any time there might be an outbreak of Indians, and telegraphed to Washington for troops. Through the newspapers publishing this request, Meeker was attacked before the troops could reach him.

Rawlins, Wyo., 29.—James Drais, General Merritt's chief of scouts, came into Rawlins, this morning, with dispatches and mail. He reports numerous fresh Indian trails crossing the road in the vicinity of Williams' Fork and Mow Rapids, and also a camp fire near Milk River. About eight miles north of Snake River, at the crossing of Cottonwood Creek, on the Muddy, he saw three Indians. He and Eugene Taylor, one of Merritt's scouts, fired upon them, and they retreated up the bed of the creek. Drais came on into Rawlins, warning the escort with the body of Lieut. Weir, which was a short distance ahead of him, and also a number of ranchmen on their way to Snake River. Lieut. Weir's body will be here on Thursday morning and will be received by Col. Brackett's command. The funeral services will be held here and the remains shipped east.

FOREIGN.

LONDON, 27.—A dispatch from Rome says: An American lady and gentleman named Baron were attacked in a railway carriage on the Alta Italia line, a few days ago, by two men, one of whom drew a revolver and the other a knife. After a violent struggle, the robbers succeeded in getting possession of the gentleman's purse and watch, and escaped by dropping off the foot board when the train slackened its speed.

A lady of rank encloses to the London Times a letter dated September 17, from her son's agent, deeming it of interest to those dependent on Irish property. The writer says he has fears that he cannot collect the entire amount of her jointure due at Michaelmas, and proceeds: "Even those tenants who are well able to pay are afraid to pay as the resolution arrived at is to shoot the tenant who pays as well as anyone who takes a farm from which a tenant has been evicted for non-payment. I fear much that matters will end badly. This is the worst year I recollect since the famine. I fear that few of the small farmers can hold their land at any rent. Cattle and sheep are unsalable, and as for the crops, they are all lost in consequence of the never-ceasing rains."

The five men hanged for complicity in the massacre of the British embassy include Kotwal, of Cabul, the head of the city Mollahs, and two generals, one of royal blood. One of the generals, it is claimed, dragged the head of Major Cavagnari from the British Residency to Balahalsur.

The Prefect of the Paris Police has forbidden the appearance of the *Mat D'Orde* newspaper, which was to take the place of the *Marseillaise* during its suspension, for insulting the magistracy and defending currencies, which the law characterizes as crimes.

The German Minister of Ecclesiastical Affairs, speaking at a public dinner at Essen, said: "You are aware that the Emperor has sacrificed his personal feelings to the public weal. He has done so because he thought it his duty to conclude the alliance which he hopes will secure the peace of Europe."

LONDON, 28.—Hanlon has been sent a formal demand for the return of the challenge cup. Meanwhile the trustees have been invited to consider Elliott's proposal

to include the cup in his race with Boyd.

The Spanish minister of foreign affairs has received a copy of the treaty of peace between Spain and Peru, ratified by the latter.

The corvet *Cormus* and sloop of war *Albatross*, it is understood, will proceed to the China station as soon as they are ready for sea, in view of the pending rupture between China and Japan, and the friendly attitude of Russia towards China.

It is reported that Don Carlos will be requested to leave France in consequence of his reception of and other public interchanges of courtesies with army officers. Some of whom have been subjected to army discipline for the same cause.

The *Journal Des Debats* condemns Lord Salisbury's optimism towards the Austro-German alliance and says: The result will be European complications which will leave Austria without allies confronting all Christian nations of Eastern Europe, whose legitimate ambitions she seeks to stifle for her own advantage.

Le *Soliel* reports an interview with Italian statesmen of various shades of opinion, all of whom advocate an understanding between Latin and Slavonic races as a counterpoise to the Austro-German alliance.

Major Deserpa Pinto, the distinguished African explorer, is seriously ill.

Additional hands have been taken on by most of the leading iron works in the Leeds district, orders having been received which will provide occupation during the whole winter. The coal branch of the trade is also improving.

LONDON, 29.—Cardinal Manning will leave London for Rome on the 9th of November, to endeavor to win the assent of the Vatican to his long cherished scheme, which by admitting certain changes in the eternal organization of the Catholic Church in England, will facilitate the return to Catholicism of an important group of English Protestants.

A radical committee at Vaulcuse has offered to Humbert the candidature for member of the Chamber of Deputies in place of Joseph General, who has been appointed Governor of Martineque. Humbert has accepted the candidature.

A fete of the Paris newspapers for the benefit of the sufferers by the recent floods in Murcia, Spain. It is expected that the fete will surpass in entertainment and receipts and previous efforts of this kind in Paris.

DeLesseps delivered a lecture in Paris on Monday, on the Panama Canal, and announced that he would start for Panama early in December.

An Alexandria correspondent reports that Cleopatra's Needle, while being removed for shipment to the United States, was seized by the creditors of the Egyptian government.
