

THE SAGACITY OF THE SPIDER.—The intelligence displayed by this creature has always been the admiration of entomologists, but we are not aware that any notice has been taken by them of the following remarkable fact. The web of the spider, particularly of a summer morning, will be seen to glitter as if covered with dew. This glittering appearance is produced by a lime with which it is carefully spread by the insect to entrap and secure gnats and flies. If you touch the web with your finger, it adheres and is broken when you withdraw it. Touch, however, the braces by which the web is supported, and your finger glides off as if from a thread of glass. The sagacity of the spider in leaving the braces unlimed is astonishing. This part of his structure not being intended as a trap, would be broken if it were limed, as it would necessarily be torn asunder if it were touched by any flying object; but, in the condition in which it is provided, it allows the fly to glide off and leave the web unharmed.—[Ex.]
